## Home Gives Policy Talk Before UN

The Earl of Home, British foreign secretary, urged the United Nations General Assembly to pressure the Soviet Union to halt tensions on the Berlin wall. He called the Communist wall "an almost intolerable provocation to civilized people."

He expressed hope the assembly would make clear to the Soviet Union it must stop "artificially creating crises" in the divided city and negotiate a settlement with the West which pays due regard to the rights and interests of all parties.

Lord Home made the statements in a major policy speech at the 108-nation assembly. Adlai Stevenson, chief U.S. delegate, commented outside the assembly hall that the speech expressed a viewpoint with

## Liberal Leader Blasts Gov't's Spending Habits

In touching on the spending habits of the Conservative government in this province, Liberal leader A. W. Matheson, told last night's annual meeting of the 8th Queens Young Liberal Association, "their chickens are now coming home to roost, and there is going to be quite a few chickens."

In this connection he referred to two of what he termed the many blunders by the government, the fish plant at Rustico and the milk ranch at Morell. The former represents a total loss of some \$25,000 and the latter a partial loss amounting to about \$20,000, he said.

Another financial matter that he declared needed looking into is that of travelling expenses. To 1961 Mr. Matheson said that this amounted to approximately \$170,000. For a province of the size of P. E. I. to permit such expenses to soar to such heights there must be something radically wrong with the system they, the government, are using.

He declared that when the present government is voted out of office, they will be leaving a terrible mess behind them. One of these messes, he said, is in the matter of tenders.

**TENDER SYSTEM**

"The tender system seems to be going by the board, particularly for road and building construction," he said. He claimed that the present system is to give the job to brother, sister or some other relative.

He suggested the members take note of all these blunders, and said, "you young people are going to be the ones to pay for these mistakes that are being made by the government of today."

Mr. Matheson would not venture a forecast as to when the next provincial election would take place, but he urged the young Liberals to start getting out now and do their part in laying the groundwork to ensure a Liberal victory.

He told them to get on with the work of re-organizing the party in 5th Queens, a project which was started several months ago. He noted at the last election the other parties were far better organized at the polls than was the Liberal party which could successfully continue

A draft agreement was tabled a month ago in Helsinki. The agreement for 50 years, covers the 36-mile long Salama Canal on the southeastern border of Finland since the 1941 Soviet-Finnish peace treaty 21 miles of it have been under Russian jurisdiction.
