What the country wants to know now—and that quickly—is what about the new tariff. The country will be in suspense until this information has been afforded.

Captain Laing's force has routed the Matabele at Bulawayo, killing the famous Chief Selenbo and three of his sons, together with two hundred and fifty of their followers. Umbal station is now safe.

Mr. Laurier's first public speech since his election was given at Montreal on Thursday evening last, and contained the following significant words:—"The Province of Quebec has taken its place at the head of the Confederation—we must not forget that."

Mr. Clarke Wallace's majority in West York was 3,425 over the combined votes of the Patron and nothing else like this on the record. West York is really the kind of man it wants to be represented by, and has him.

Those who attempt to belittle the Premier's tour in Ontario will note that four constituencies in which Sir Charles spoke, Western Ontario, North Waterloo, South Wellington, South Brant and Welland, returned Conservatives in the place of the Liberal representatives that sat in the last Parliament.

According to the returns published by THE EXAMINER to-day, the parliamentary delegations from the provinces, outside of Quebec, are divided about equally. Conservatives having one-half and Liberals, Patrons and McCarthyites combined the other. It is Quebec alone which recalls a rousing old Mowat Liberal campaign song, which ran something like this:

"Beware of the French Canadian horde, On-ta-reco, On-ta-reco."

The Sunday School Journal says that the Uniform International Lessons are now taught under the auspices of the Methodist Episcopal Church in nearly twenty different languages throughout the world, and in nine different languages in the United States. The Baptist Education Society has just announced that the circulation of its Lesson Helps has increased 192,000 copies during the current quarter. Corresponding facts could, doubtless, be shown by other denominations.

A startling rumor is current in Montreal to the effect that a large number of business men waited on Mr. Laurier, asking the latter to have Sir Richard Cartwright as his finance minister. It may also be added that the name of Mr. Geo. Cox, of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, has been mentioned in leading Liberal circles as the probable finance minister of the Laurier cabinet. The story is that if Mr. Frankland is maintained in his seat for East York he will make way for Mr. Cox in that constituency.

The New York vote is solid for Laurier. The New York Sun puts it this way: "We heartily acclaim the advent of the Liberals to power at Ottawa. They laugh at the silly talk about imperial institutions and are friendly to our institutions and our people; they fully appreciate the value to Canadians of free trade with the United States; and when they are convinced by experience that the institutions are procurable only by one course, amalgamation with the United States, they will see to it that the course is taken."

It is to be remembered that Mr. Laurier's organ, edited by Pacaud, made the following declaration on the day before the elections: "Let this fact be well recalled: All the Liberal candidates have pledged themselves in writing to vote in favor of a remedial bill such as is demanded by our bishops. No Conservative candidate has yet taken this solemn engagement."

NEWS NOTES

The Russian fleet is suffering from an attack of scurvy.

It is now stated that 27,000 persons were drowned and 8,000 were injured during the recent tidal wave and earthquake in the northern provinces of Japan.

No other great power would for a moment have stood the series of attacks of Venezuelan soldiers on British officials."

The London Chronicle publishes a letter from Mr. Gladstone on the subject of the Armenians, in which he says:—"Nobody uses language half so strong against the Sultan and his agents. To describe their guilt is beyond all bounds. My choice is between far-out-tending everybody and absolute silence; for my language abstractly might give rise to the charge of temper, whereas it would be perfectly cold blooded. I am silent only for fear of doing harm. The European mind wants plausible excuses to cover its disgrace. I do not wish to furnish them."

Special Meeting at Boston—Third Day of the 8th Session.

ANGLICAN SYNOD.

Annual Address by the Lord Bishop.

The provincial synod of the Church of England met in St. Luke's cathedral, Halifax, on Friday, when the opening sermon was preached by Rev. Dyson Hague.

The first business meeting was convened at three o'clock, the lord bishop presiding. Rev. W. J. A. Annet was elected clerical secretary. The lord bishop made his annual address. In opening he referred to the fact that contributions by religious societies in England for prosecuting the work of the Church of England in the diocese are being rapidly reduced, and that by the end of another three or four years they may be expected to have come to an end. Upon this he urged the necessity of taking steps to meet the deficiency created by such action by eliciting much larger contributions from the church people of the diocese, who require to be moved to meet the demand by rightly appealing to them; that they shall provide for the supply of their own religious necessities, and also help to support the missionaries of the church in Algoma and the Northwest and the diocese of England. He then addressed himself to the clergy, referring to the great discrepancy existing between the returns made by them of the numbers of the Church of England people in the diocese, and the actual number of persons in watching over their flock; also exhorting them to increased reverence in rendering the services in church, and more care for what might be some slight small and trifling details, but which might if unattended to have an ill effect upon their own spiritual life and that of their people. Then an earnest appeal was made for taking steps to meet the deficiency created by such action by eliciting much larger contributions from the church people of the diocese, who require to be moved to meet the demand by rightly appealing to them; that they shall provide for the supply of their own religious necessities, and also help to support the missionaries of the church in Algoma and the Northwest and the diocese of England.

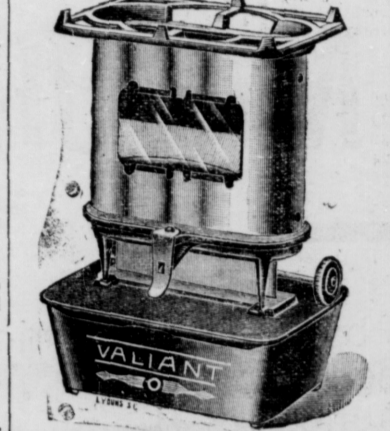

THE NEW GOVERNMENT.

Tarte Must be in it—Speculations of the Politicians.

MONTEAL, June 29.

It is now pretty well understood that Messrs. Laurier, Tarte, Geoffroy and Fisher will hold portfolios in the new administration, and that Joseph Gauthier, M. P. for L'Assomption, will resign his seat in favor of Tarte; that Francois Langlois, M. P., will be Speaker of the Commons, and that when Sir Adolphe Chapleau's term expires at Spencerwood either Sir Henry Joly or Senator Pelletier will be appointed Lieut.-Governor of the Province of Quebec.

It is also on the tapis to appoint Hoar, Felix Marchand, Leader of the Liberal Opposition at Quebec, as Canadian Commissioner at Paris; and to install Mr. B. Anselmi, M. P. for Berthier, as Leader of the Liberal Party at the ancient capital.

Mr. Laurier's friends make no secret of their intention of attempting to dislodge the local Conservative Government. But most people think they have their hands full at Ottawa. A Canadian representative at Washington is likewise to be appointed, and Sir Richard Cartwright is said to be booked for that sooner or later.

STANDING OF THE PARTIES.

Small Liberal Majority Over All.

MONTEAL, June 29.

The latest returns show the standing of the parties by provinces as follows—one election yet to be held in Ontario:

FAST ATLANTIC SERVICE.

Contract Goes to Allan Line.

OTTAWA, June 29.

Provided the home authorities assent to one slight modification in the contract for the Fast Atlantic service, it is settled that it will go to the Allan Line for \$1,125,000 a year for ten years. Of this amount the Imperial Government is expected to contribute \$315,000 a year. The contract is subject to ratification by Parliament, and although some Liberals objected to the project last session, it is questionable whether they will venture to throw out the contract.
