THE CHICAGO STRIKE.
Washington advices state that President
Cleveland has appointed John D. Kernan,
of New York, and Nicholas E. Worthington,
of Illinois, to act with Labor Com-
missioner Carroll D. Wright in the presi-
dential commission to investigate the Chi-
cago strike. Kernan is a well-known law-
yer of Utica, N. Y., and a son of ex-U. S.
Senator Kernan. He has been a particu-
lar, thorough student of labor questions,
and has written several important con-
tributions to the literature of this subject.
He was appointed one of the railroad com-
missioners of New York state by Mr.
Cleveland, then governor of the state. He
had this position for some time after the
election of Governor Hill, but finally re-
sisted and entered into the practice of law
in New York city. Mr. Kernan presided
at the anti-trust convention in 1892.
Nicholas F. Worthington, of Peoria,
Ill., is at present judge of the circuit court
for the central district of Illinois. He has
been several terms in congress and was
the professor of Col. Post, the present
representative from the Peoria district.
He is prominent, and, it is said, admirably
fitted to take part in the proposed investi-
gation.

THEY WANTED WORK.
A special to the Buffalo News from New
York says: Rather an unusual sight was
witnessed upon Broadway on Wednesday
afternoon near Chambers street. The
street was packed with people. Three
fourly-dressed men came along. They had
white shirts.
Their clothes were clean, boots neatly
brushed, and they did not look like men
who drank. Around each of their necks
was a card on which the following was
inscribed in big, black letters: "I want
work of any kind." This was new to New
Yorkers. They looked at the men and
then at the cards around their necks.
Men and women stopped to express a word
of sympathy. Some offered them alms.
"No," they said, "We are not beggars, we
want work."
It was a strange sight and a new depart-
ure for the unemployed to go about with
cards around their necks begging work.
This idea will be quickly followed by
others, and it won't be long before hun-
dreds of unemployed will be wearing simi-
lar cards. "Curse the tariff tinkers,"
was one sympathetic remark, as three men
wended northward through the crowd.
