THE TRANSVAAL SITUATION

Careful Statement of the Duke of Devonshire.

STILL A HOPE OF A PEACEFUL ISSUE

British Government will Maintain Rights of British Men and Safeguard British Interests.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

CAPE TOWN, Oct. 10.—The Transvaal Government has sent an ultimatum to Great Britain. It is said that it request an explicit assurance of the withdrawal within 48 hours of the British troops from the Transvaal border as well as the withdrawal of all British forces landed in South Africa since the diplomatic conference.

LONDON, Oct. 10.—The Duke of Devonshire, Lord President of the Council of Ministers, speaking at Sheffield last night said that the deduction made from his recent speech at Manchester regarding the Transvaal situation had warned him that a member of the government could not be too careful in respect to his public utterances.

"Matters have not become more critical during the last few days" remarked the duke, "and I trust this interval for reflection may conduce to a pacific settlement." His grace added, however that he was afraid the only hopeful sign was the fact that the government of the South African Republic did not appear inclined to precipitate any acts of aggression upon British territory such as their previous preparations led the British government to anticipate as within the possibilities. No doubt, the longer such an attempt should be delayed, the less would be the probability of even a temporary success.

"Although the Government does not consider it right," said his grace, "to relax any measures deemed necessary, and although preparations for a possible campaign are still in full progress, I think I may say that the country may rest assured that no irretrievable step will be taken until the Transvaal has received and has full opportunity to consider the demands which the British Government consider necessary to the rights of their fellow citizens and to safeguard British interests in South Africa.

"In these comments there is a chance, perhaps only a remote chance, that wiser counsels than have hitherto prevailed may assert themselves.

"I don't complain of the speeches of independent politicians, although it may be doubtful that such utterances tend to peace. But a different kind of responsibility rests upon those directly connected with the Government.

"Although I did not regret anything I said on former occasions when dealing with this question, yet the handle which that speech has given certain irresponsible negotiators to open communication on their own account, has warned me that at the present time a member of the Government cannot be too careful of what he says and that the wisest thing, perhaps, is to abstain even from good words.

"There is no reason, in my opinion, to apprehend that matters have assumed the critical stage, and I trust that the interval for reflection may conduce to a settlement which all the arguments and persuasion hitherto employed have been unable to effect."

Anxiety About Coal.

CAPE TOWN, Oct. 8.—There is much anxiety lest the Orange Free State seize the coal consigned to Cape Colony from the Free State mines. This would cripple the railway service, and also the navy, which rely on the Dundee coal fields for supplies. The native miners have abandoned these fields. As warships must be employed to carry despatches from Natal to Cape Colony and vice versa, it is most important that there be no scarcity in the supply of coal.

VIENNA, Oct. 9.—It is reported that there has been a rupture of diplomatic relations between Russia and Servia. The Neue Freie Presse states that the Russian agent at Belgrade has left that capital.

BIRMINGHAM, Oct. 9.—The Post says the latest gossip in geographical circles is that something like a mutiny has broken out on the Fram Arctic expedition under Sverdrup. The naval lieutenant in charge of the ship, it is reported, refused to submit to Sverdrup's authority. Chaos reigned on board, and it was expected that the men would desert on the first opportunity.

The Boers Hesitate

LADYSMITH, Oct. 8.—The British force has been greatly strengthened during the last 24 hours. I suspect that the hesitation of the Boers is due to their changing their imperfect cartridges, their lack of support, and the backhanging of the Free State column.

In my judgment, the Boers are no match for well-led British troops. Even their guerilla tactics can be checked without an overwhelming army of regulars. Recollect, that in arranging any peaceable settlement, there is danger that the Kafirs will conclude that England is afraid of the Boers and must be reckoned with. The burghers want war. The newest plan is for General Joubert to pretend defeat at Leing's Nek, when General Buller follows him through the passes.
