City Police And Legion Hold First Annual Rifle Shoot

The first annual rifle shoot between the Charlottetown Police Force and members of the Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Legion was held last night at the Charlottetown Armouries.

In all 26 shooters took part in the shoot which was divided into 8 relay shoots.

Constable Preston Hillier of the city police in winning the first relay a 50 for the only perfect score of the night. Forty nines were scored by legionnaire Vern Larter and Constable A. Bishop.

Shoot-offs were required to declare winners in relays 2 and 3. In relay 2 Staff Sergeant A. J. Dowling and Legionnaire Vic Bowlan tied with 47's in the first shoot-off and in a single shot shoot-off Sergeant Dowling scored a bulls-eye for a 10 and Bowlan got an inner for a 9.

In the shoot-off in relay 3 Legionnaire Bun Duffy carded a 47 to Constable H. MacKinnon's 46.

Other winners were Legionnaire Phil Hughes 46; Constable A. Bishop 49; Legionnaire Loyola Murnaghan 47; Deputy Chief of Police Stierns Webster 36; and Constable J. E. Howatt 48.

The Garrison Officers Mess and the Garrison C. O.'s Mess were hosts to the shoot, which was arranged by Brig. G. K. Peake, Commander of 2nd Militia Group.

A scheduled shoot between Police Chief MacArthur and Legionnaire Len Goodwin had to be cancelled due to the unavoidable absence of the legionnaire.

Dodgers Buy Sal Maglie

BROOKLYN (AP)—The Dodgers Tuesday purchased Sal (the Barber) Maglie, veteran righthanded pitcher and their old Giant nemesis, from the Cleveland Indians and sold righthander Jim Hughes to the Chicago Cubs. Both were straight cash deals for undisclosed amounts.

Maglie, 39, has a lifetime major league pitching record of 95 victories and 44 defeats — and 23 of those victories were at the expense of the Dodgers. The Indians bought him from the Giants last July but he has seen little action for them.

Hughes, who spent part of last season at St. Paul, is 33. He has been with the Dodgers off and on since 1952. During the 1954 season he set a Brooklyn record by appearing in 69 games, winning eight and losing four. Like Maglie he has not been credited with a decision so far this year.

Santee's Hopes Of Regaining Amateur Status Are Crushed

NEW YORK (AP)—Wes Santee's hopes of regaining his amateur status and running in the Olympic games apparently were crushed Tuesday when the New York State Supreme Court upheld the lifetime suspension imposed on the Kansas miler by the U.S. Amateur Athletic Union.

Justice Walter A. Lynch, who handed down a biting opinion after six weeks' deliberation, also rapped amateur officials who seek to capitalize on sports stars.

"He (Santee) has eliminated himself as an amateur athlete," Justice Lynch said, "but not without an assist from some of the guardians of amateur athletics."

"Promoters of amateur athletic meets should realize that while Santee by his conduct, disqualified himself from amateur competition, the fault lies in no small part with them as a class."

"The records show that in their desire for larger gate receipts some promoters have sought to capitalize on the athletic ability of such stars as Santee. From this unfortunate incident some good may come to amateur athletics in the United States."

The decision may have brought an end to the prolonged court fight which followed Santee's suspension Feb. 19 on charges that he took money above allowable expenses for competing the track meets.

Charles Grimes, Santee's counsel, said that while there are further legal steps he might take he does not know yet whether they will be pursued.

Santee, a Marine lieutenant stationed at Quantico, Va., said he had expected the opinion to be more severe and added that Justice Lynch "pointed out things we have been pointing out." In reference apparently to track meet promoters.

Justice Lynch said evidence that Santee engaged a booking agent and demanded excessive expenses for both himself and his wife "foreclose any serious consideration of his plea that he was harshly or unfairly dealt with."

"His repentance, if any — and the court thinks there is none — comes too late," the Justice added.

The court struck down two of Santee's main contentions: That the AAU executive committee which suspended him acted without jurisdiction and that the AAU's expense limitations are "dead letters."

Santee was specifically charged with expense account irregularities totalling about \$1,500 in seven 1955 meets, including three big California events.

Richards Options Rookie Pitcher

KANSAS CITY (AP)—Manager Paul Richards of Baltimore Orioles announced Tuesday he plans to option rookie pitcher Fred Besana to Vancouver Mounties of the Pacific Coast League on 24-hour recall. The move will bring the Orioles down to the 25-player limit.

Thomas Swims Puget Sound

TACOMA, Wash. (AP)—Chilled and tired but obviously happy, one-time logger Bert Thomas early Tuesday became the first person in history to swim Puget Sound between Seattle and Tacoma.

The former marine frogman heaved himself from the 46-degree water at 4:04 a.m. PDT after battling the tides of the sound for 18½ miles.

So said Warren C. Giles, president of the National League.

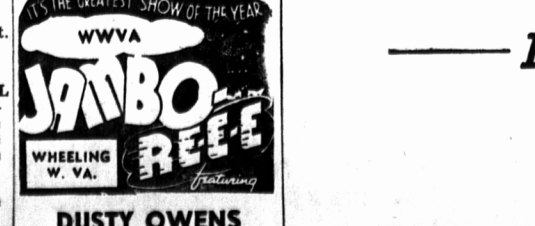
Walter F. O'Malley, president of the Brooklyn Club, was quoted following the game as saying Erskine would be rewarded with \$500.

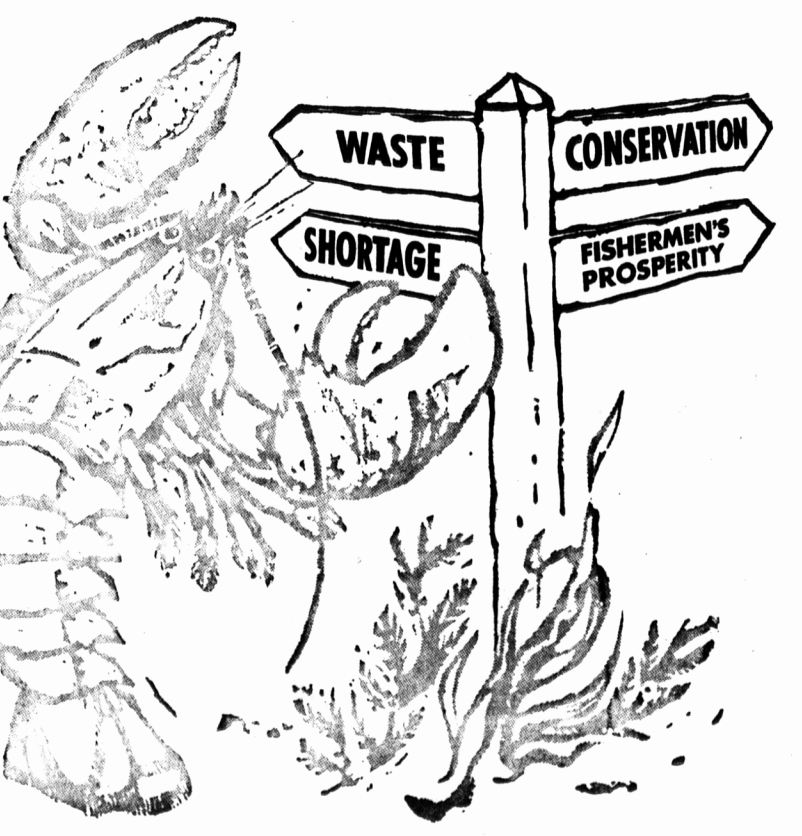

Veterans Power Giants To Win Over Chicago Cubs

Two veterans broke out of batting slumps and a youngster gained his second pitching victory Tuesday in the only day games in the major leagues.

At New York, Willie Mays and Don Mueller broke their batting slumps with six hits, including a homer each, as New York Giants downed the Chicago Cubs 6-4 in the National League.

In the American League, young Paul Foytack gained his second mound victory as Detroit Tigers pleased a hometown crowd with a 13-hit attack to double the Boston Red Sox 6-3.

GROMEK IN RELIEF

The 25-year-old righthander, making his third start of the season, needed a tight relief performance from Steve Gromek. The veteran sidearm pitched the eighth and ninth innings and struck out four of the six men he faced.

Willard Nixon was routed after 3 2/3 innings. The Tigers sent 23 men to the plate in the first four innings, scoring five runs on eight hits against Nixon, who lost his second game. He has yet to win.

Detroit had at least one hit in every inning, and every starter took part in the attack except the slump-ridden Ray Boone. The Tigers brought the Brooklyn Dodgers their fifth straight victory Tuesday night as the world champions defeated the St. Louis Cardinals 7-5.

Reese's homer, his first of the season, ended Dodger scoring for the night and handed righthander Tom Poholsky his first defeat after three victories.

The Dodgers, who started behind rookie Charlie Templeton and finished with relievers Ed Roebuck and Clem Labine, jammed their scoring into two frames. They scored three in the first on a walk, Roy Campanella's triple and Gil Hodges' two-run homer, his sixth of the year.

At New York, Johnny Antonelli, who pitched hitless ball through the first four innings, had to put down a late Chicago rally to gain his second pitching triumph of the season against three defeats. Warren Hacker was the loser.

Mays, who entered the game batting .209, blasted two singles in addition to his home run and accounted for two runs. Mueller, batting .256, matched Mays' homer in the third inning in addition to a double in the seventh, each scoring Mays.

Mays' home run was a blast which landed against the facade of the left field stands to open the third. Shortly afterwards Mueller lined one into the lower right field stands. It was his first of the season.

BROOKLYN (AP)—Four earned runs in the fourth inning, in which rookie shortstop Don Blasingame erred twice and Pee-wee Reese poled a three-run homer, brought the Brooklyn Dodgers their fifth straight victory Tuesday night as the world champions defeated the St. Louis Cardinals 7-5.
