TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, March 11.

The Speaker took the chair at 3 o'clock. Sir Richard Cartwright moved his resolution respecting Mr. Rykert's timber limit correspondence. He held that Rykert's own admission showed him to have used his position as a member for his own pecuniary advantage; that he had made an untruthful reply to the inquiry made of him in the House respecting this transaction, and that his conduct was altogether corrupt and scandalous. While, he declared, Mr. Rykert's conduct justified a motion for expulsion, he did not go so far, because he did not wish the main facts of the case to be hopelessly buried under a verbiage offered in opposition to such a motion on the ground of precedent or of similar reasons. He therefore moved that the conduct of Mr. Rykert in the premises be declared discreditable, corrupt and scandalous.

Mr. Rykert denied that there was anything in the transaction under discussion to justify the House in interfering. He held himself justified in receiving professional fees for any service which he, as a solicitor, rendered to any of his constituents. He claimed that he could produce evidence which would show that his conduct had been honorable throughout, and he said that the case should be referred to the committee on privileges and elections, so that he might be given an opportunity to set himself right.

Sir John Thompson said that Sir Richard Cartwright, in speaking to his motion, had not confined himself to the matter before the House. In view of the request made by Mr. Rykert for a reference to the committee on privileges and elections, and his assertion that he had important evidence which he could lay before the committee, he thought the House should take the matter under their serious consideration, and in order that they should have an opportunity to do so, and to consider the long statements made by Mr. Rykert, he moved the adjournment.

The debate was continued until 11.30, when the House divided. Sir John Thompson's motion was carried by 94 to 72. The House adjourned at midnight.

HONOR IN BUSINESS.

A Firm Expelled.

BOSTON, March 11. The Board of Directors of the Boston Chamber of Commerce have voted for expelling J. Hardy, of the firm of R. J. Hardy & Son for violation of the recognized agreement between the members of the Association and for other actions contrary to the spirit which should govern commercial transactions. It was also voted to suspend R. T. Hardy, junior member of the firm, and son of R. J. Hardy for sixty days. The membership now standing in the name of R. J. Hardy will be sold at auction on Friday.

Out of the Depths—Mutilated Bodies Recovered.

LONDON, March 11. Eight bodies, shockingly mutilated, have been recovered from Morass mines. Rescuers are constantly succumbing to the effects of the gas, and are obliged to make a hasty retreat. Four of the miners embombed have made their escape from the pit without assistance, through a crevice between the roof of the mine and the debris. The passed over a number of dead men, lying in heaps, and say they believe none of those in the pit are alive.

Probably Untrue.

TORONTO, March 11. The Mail's Washington special says: "A report reaches here to-day that the Canadian Pacific Railway Company has in contemplation the stoppage of traffic on its line to the sea-board through Maine, owing to the decision of the United States Senate to refuse a continuance of bonding privilege. Most searching inquiry here fails to furnish any definite information on the subject."

Strong Measures.

LISBON, March 11. The Government to-day issued a decree, dissolving the municipal government of this city, and appointing a commission to administer the affairs of the city, pending reforms relative to the municipality, which the government is now considering.

Great Flood.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., March 11. More than half of the city of Cairo is submerged, and business is paralyzed, the only means of communication being by boats and rafts.

Hotel-keepers in Trouble.

MONTREAL, March 11. J. B. Durocher, proprietor of the Richelieu Hotel, made an assignment yesterday. His liabilities are given at seventy-five thousand dollars.

Murder in Washington.

WASHINGTON, March 11. Representative Taulbee, who was shot by reporter Kincaid, died at 5 o'clock this morning.
