BIBLE STILL HOLDS ANSWER TO PROBLEMS OF MANKIND It was only a few days ago that the Royal Ontario Museum closed its doors on a truly historic and inspiring exhibit. We refer to the Biblical Exhibit which has attracted so many visitors to study the greatest Christian literary heritage of the world of God.

Many scholars and laymen alike, older people and youths as well, have spent many an interesting hour before the display cases. Surely this quinquennial celebration of the printing of the Bible of John Gutenberg has been a time for true pride of prayerful thanks to God's Providence which has granted to mankind such a spiritual treasure.

Unlike some displays in our modern museums and art galleries, displays which show us some achievements of a culture or age now completely over, this display presents to us the greatest written tradition of an historical period which still exercises a tremendous influence in the life of the true Christian. Nor is the influence of the "Christian Era" to be that of a passing era only.

Yet, recalling the promises of the Bible and the great truths recorded in it, the Christian soul must not be led to a dangerous complacency. Today the Christian is challenged as perhaps never before in history to live as a true follower of Christ and to give evidence by his actions, words and very thoughts that the truths of the Bible must have a real carry through into our twentieth century life.

Let us not forget the recent museum display. It was enshrined in one of Toronto's most noble and beautiful buildings; it received the care of its truly masterful work of art. Let the devout Christian soul enshrine the Word of God in his very soul; let its truth ennoble and enrich his whole being; let it lead him to seek God as the King of his heart and soul, as the benign Father Who is ever ready to help His wayfaring children here below.
