District W. I. Convention At Whim Road

Whim Road Women's Institute was the entertaining institute at the annual district convention which was held in Whim Road Hall yesterday afternoon and evening. The following institutes were welcomed: Heatherdale, Milltown, Upper Montague, Brooklyn, Grandview, Bellevue, and Kilmuir. There were no institute members from Caledonia or Valleyfield.

The meeting was presided over by the district president, Mrs. M. J. Munro. The secretary was Mrs. Webb Nicholson. The "Institute and Ode" the "Collect for Women" were repeated together by all present. Mrs. Cecil Campbell gave the address of welcome. The secretary read the minutes of last year's meeting which was held in Upper Montague, and these were approved and adopted as read. Some interesting questions and answers were brought to the attention of all, by Mrs. Colin MacDonald who took charge of the question box for the Kilmuir Institute.

The following committees were appointed for next year's convention. Resolutions committee: Mrs. Cecil Campbell, Mrs. John MacLeod, and Mrs. Jack Bruce. The entertaining institute will be Brooklyn with Mrs. Bob White-way as president and Mrs. John Bears, secretary. Executive committee: Mrs. M. N. MacGowan, Miss Anne MacDonald, Kilmuir, and Mrs. Martin MacDonald, Heatherdale; Mrs. Lawrence Stuart, and Mrs. Bob Campbell, Whim Road; Mrs. Max Cooper, and Mrs. A. J. MacPherson, Bellevue; Mrs. A. J. MacPherson, and Mrs. Olive Finlayson, Grandview; Mrs. William Stewart, and Mrs. J. King, Milltown, Mrs. Roy Gillis, and Mrs. Dan MacDonald, Upper Montague.

Parts allotted to each institute were as follows: reception committee, Bellevue; sing-song, Valleyfield; question box, Grandview; education, Kilmuir; fun and nonsense, Whim Road; exhibits, Milltown. The reply to the address of welcome will be given by Caledonia Institute. It was decided that for the sing-song each institute should suggest selections.

The first speaker of the afternoon was Miss Marion Hill, who spoke on education. Miss Hill brought up the question as to whether our province provides equal opportunities for education in rural schools as compared to those in the city. A one room school cannot compete with schools having 12 grades. Miss Hill stated that we should not leave education to the rural school teachers alone. Different organizations such as the church, boys and girls clubs, Red Cross, etc., should help to supplement the work of the teachers. She went on to say that the radio is a strong influence on the child today; motion pictures influence the child's mind also. It was further stated by Miss Hill that after the eighth grade, one rural youth in eight attends college. They should be educated for both rural and urban life. She mentioned the vocational school in Charlottetown and the different courses it provides. In the Home Management Course under the leadership of Miss Hill, eighteen girls were taught cooking, sewing, crocheting, time management, etiquette, table manners, etc. She mentioned other courses available, such as farm mechanics, forestry, and wood lot management. She concluded her remarks by requesting the Women's Institutes, to encourage the young people of the district to attend the courses.

Following Miss Hill's address, the secretaries from each district gave a report of their years work and what they have accomplished. The next speaker introduced was Miss Heather MacLean, of the Institute Office in Charlottetown, who gave a demonstration of articles for sale at the bazaar. She mentioned a new plan for district convention where the province would be divided into six districts, two to each county, and two mem-

bers from each county would attend these conventions; there would also be a rally held once a year, at which all members of the different institutes would be present. She mentioned also a scholarship of one hundred dollars provided by the Music Festival for music teachers attending a refresher course to teach in the rural school districts. One scholarship would be provided for each county. Mrs. Malcolm MacPhee was the final speaker for the afternoon. Her subject was "Education in The Rural Schools." Different phases of education mentioned by Mrs. MacPhee were physical education, intellectual education, vocational education, and moral education, which would build character. She mentioned the advantage of using leisure time in proper reading and music. Mrs. MacPhee requested the parents give all the assistance they could to the teachers. She closed her remarks by stating that there are no problem pupils—just problem parents. Following Mrs. Mac
