## NEWS FROM THE CAPITAL.

**Revenue Half a Million Behind in Four Months.**

**Mulock's Jubilee Stamp Project—Fast Atlantic Service.**

OTTAWA, Nov. 8.—The revenue for the four months ending Oct. 31st was half a million behind the same period last year. It would have been far worse but Hon. Mr. Mulock made two hundred thousand dollars out of his Jubilee stamp project.

Lt. Col Bliss, Deputy Assistant Adjutant General, has resigned from public service.

The Beaver Line has notified the government to prepare to sign the contract for the Atlantic mail service. The manager of the Beaver Line says the contract was discussed and settled to the satisfaction of all parties including the Canadian Pacific. St. John is to be the freight terminus, while mails will be taken aboard at Halifax. The first mail will be by the Steamer Gallia which will leave Liverpool on Saturday next.

## Lost on Black Rock.

HALIFAX, Nov. 8.—The St. John ship John McLeod, from Hilo with sugar, struck Black Rock a mile and a half off Sambro yesterday morning and went to pieces. The crew was saved. The cargo was valued at a hundred thousand dollars. It was insured in the Atlantic Mutual, New York.

## Fatal Fire Near Halifax.

HALIFAX, Nov. 8.—The house of George Tullock, at Cole Harbor Road, three miles from Halifax, was burned. Mrs. Tullock's sister, Maria Walker, and a two-year-old son of Tullocks, were burned to death.

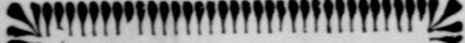
## Stanley's Movements.

## LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 4.—Advices are received here that the captain and eight men of an American sealing schooner who got separated from the vessel in boats and landed at Kamtschatka, were arrested by the Russians for poaching on seal preserves and compelled to work in a stone quarry, until liberated by the British cruiser Daphne on Sept. 27th. They were tried by Russian authorities and acquitted on Oct. 3rd.

LONDON, November 6.—The Constantinople correspondent of the Times says: "The sultan peremptorily refuses to permit lights on the Dardanelles or the Gulf of Salonica until the peace treaty between Turkey and Greece has been signed. The order of the palace to the port regarding the Bulgarian basis is to temporarize. The Bulgarian agent here threatens to demand his passport."

LONDON, Nov. 5.—The Chronicle says that being convinced by the most unqueerly language of the queen's alleged congratulations to ex-President Cleveland upon the birth of a son, that the report that she had sent such congratulations was untrue, it investigated the matter. As a result it has obtained a personal denial that Mr. Cleveland has received a message from the queen.

## Fireproofing Wood.

Another method of fireproofing wood has been brought forward—this time at Hurlingham, where the British Non-inflammable Wood company has given an exhibition designed to demonstrate the security against fire of buildings constructed with timber treated by their new process. For the purpose of the experiment two buildings about 11 feet square and 30 in height had been set up—similar in all respects, except that one was made of "treated" timber and the other of ordinary timber, each being also furnished with a chimney for the purpose of treating a strong draft and facilitating combustion. Outside of these houses, on the windward, firewood and shavings were piled, which were set on fire simultaneously. In five minutes the building of ordinary timber was well on fire and in about half an hour reduced to ashes, while the other structure remained intact save for the charring of the woodwork on the side exposed to the direct action of the flames. A further test had meanwhile been applied by igniting a pile of shavings and fagots inside, but again the effect was merely to char the wood, which did not break into flame. A box, too, made of the treated wood and which had been placed in the midst of the ignited material was afterward drawn out practically uninjured.—New York Sun.

## A Use For English Sparrows.

The crusade against the killing of our song birds cannot but receive the indorsement of every right minded woman. We are all ready to join any Audubon societies and to help in every way to keep our forests peopled with beauty and usefulness with song. But there is a little rowdy fellow beyond the pale of our sympathies—that wicked little fighter, the English sparrow. Individually he is harmless enough, but collectively he is capable of the greatest mischief. The extermination of our song birds is apparently the chief aim of his existence. We can never forgive him, but our wrath against him should be mollified because of his one redeeming point—he is good in pie. "Four and twenty" of him would reproduce that matchless dish of nursery fame. Under the alias of "reedbird" he is constantly sold in our markets and praised by purchasers in the final act of disposing of him. So let us enjoy sparrow pie in and out of season, since we may do so without a moral twinge and indeed feel that we are doing society a service.—Ella Morris Kretschmar in Woman's Home Companion.

## A Tube Straightening Machine.

As is generally known, when cold drawn steel tubing emerges from the die it curves more or less and must be straightened before it can be used. This process of straightening has usually been done by hand, but a machine which is made at Hagerstown, Ind., not only straightens tubing, but at the same time polishes it and removes dents, kinks and all other imperfections. It will operate equally well on gas pipe or shaftings.—Iron Age.
