



ACCIDENTS IN MONTROSE AREA

A deceptive curve on the North approach to the Montrose Bridge and the narrow width of the bridge itself has been the cause of numerous accidents over the past years. The panel truck (left), reportedly driven by a resident of

Alberton South, went out of control last Friday evening, clipped off a number of bridge railings, a telephone pole, and came to a stop on the outside of the bridge only several feet from deep water. No one was injured but damage to the vehicle was extensive. Sometime Sunday night a late model Pontiac car (right) carrying Quebec plates slid off the snow covered pavement at Montrose and turned upside down in the ditch. Five passengers and the driver, all from Tignish, were uninjured. The top of the car was crushed down and the trunk compartment damaged.

Ferry Cabot Strait Is Pulled Off Newfoundland Sand Bar

HALIFAX (CP) — Two ships were free of ice and sand, a third was washed higher by Atlantic tides and the crew of a fourth was looking for a new ship Tuesday as shipping men along the Atlantic coast took a breather from rescue operations.

Set free from her landlocked cradle at Grand Bay, Nfld., a few miles from Port aux Basques was the Newfoundland ferry Cabot Strait. The 2,000-ton ship went aground Jan. 17 during a blizzard after missing the harbor entrance to Port aux Basques. She was pulled off her sandy perch by the New York tug Curb with little serious damage reported.

The transport department ice-breaker Saurel, trapped in ice off the Newfoundland west coast for 10 days, was freed Monday by the ferry William Carson which had left Halifax Saturday on emergency orders. The Saurel received 35 tons of fresh water from the William Carson for her boilers. Both ships are still in ice and are reported to have halted temporarily for winds to clear ice formations in their path.

Fumes still issued from the beached freighter Maid of L'Anse-au-Loup, aground at Cape Sable Island in southwest Nova Scotia Tuesday as she was rolled higher by an Atlantic tide, backed by a southwest wind.

WAIT FOR TIDES

Local residents fear the flat-bottomed 408-ton vessel beached early Monday with a fire in her hold may have to wait for tides until mid-February high tides. Several local boats were put to a line aboard the stranded ship Tuesday in an attempt to pull her into deep water but they failed.

Elect Six Town Councillors In Kensington Voting Tuesday

Only 194 voters turned out in yesterday's civic election at Kensington in which all three members who had renominated were also elected to the six-man council.

Those re-elected are: W. Elmer Paynter, Bruce MacLeod and Bruce Roberts. The three new councillors are: Leslie Clark, William F. MacLean and Robert Carruthers. Three other candidates also ran for council seats.

Teachers Of Kinkora Meet In Workshop

At a recent workshop of the teachers of Kinkora area the following matters were discussed: That the demonstrations at the spring convention be made suitable for one room schools, rather than for one or two grade classrooms. The teachers did not consider that the demonstrations given at past conventions were very practical for the majority of teachers present.

Small discussion groups among teachers are interested in being divided according to interest grades, and sub-divided if necessary. If teachers were given definite questions to discuss, these meetings might serve a useful purpose.

The Grade X teachers request a meeting with the setters of the provincial examinations. They feel that they should have some voice in the setting of these examinations as do the teachers of Grades XI and XII.

As television is evidently showing its influence on children, and its effects on their school work, the teachers think that a joint co-operation against this modern influence might help to educate parents to their real need of supervising their children's programme study, and bed-time hours.

A discussion on discipline brought forth the suggestion that the School Act be amended so as not to make teachers responsible for pupils' behaviour to and from school, and during dinner hour. In large schools where a problem of discipline occurs at noon, it would thus be necessary to have someone engaged as supervisor of play, while teachers have this hour free as do employees in other professions.

The three new commissioners are: F.A. DesRoches, Sr., chairman, (3 years); Eric DesRoches (2 years); Alfred Gaudet (1 year). The temporary commission members, who had taken office only last month after the village was authorized to incorporate, did not seek reelection. They were: D.H. Gallant, Jerry Richard, and Reginald Laughlin.

Village Of St. Eleanors Holds Annual Meeting Of Ratepayers

The annual meeting of the ratepayers of St. Eleanors was held last evening in the village hall with Mr. Earl Cannon presiding and upwards of 40 residents in attendance.

Commissioners elected for a three, two and one year period respectively are: Earl Cannon, chairman, (re-elected), Edwin Bernard (re-elected), and Wendell Rogers.

In his report for 1956, Mr. Cannon stated that a tax of \$2.00 per ratepayer had been levied and a grant of \$893.00 had been received from the government. He said that he was certain that some concessions in regard to the present cost of electricity would be gained through a reduced rate or a lower service charge.

Mr. Edwin Bernard read the financial report and the proposed budget for 1957. Budget proposals and estimates include: \$15.00 for a village seal; \$40.00 for census taking (last census figure is 78); \$150.00 for village clerk; cost of four village sign; \$3,000 for fire fighting equipment; cost of installation of a yellow blinker caution light at St. Eleanors corner.

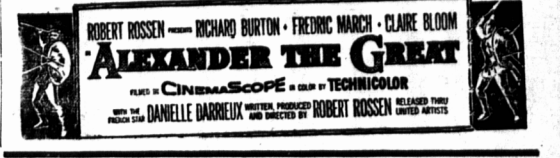
Victoria Tax Rates Will Be Reduced, Meeting Is Informed
