GERMAN PRESS BITTERLY ASSAILS POLAND

PREMIER KING SILENT RE ELECTION DATE

PLEASANTRIES EXCHANGED AT LIBERAL MEET

Premier King Refuses To Commit Himself With Regard To Any Situation That May Arise.

TORONTO, Aug. 8.—(CP)—Prime Minister Mackenzie King declared to an audience of nearly 4,000 people tonight that he would not now or at any future time make a statement of Canada's stand toward a hypothetical situation that might arise in some other part of the world.

Addressing those attending a banquet marking the 20th anniversary of his election as National Liberal Leader, the Prime Minister said he had often been asked to make a statement of his Government's attitude toward European affairs.

Question Unanswered
At no time in his address did the Prime Minister make any reference to the question uppermost in the minds of most of his listeners—the date of the next general election.

BRITAIN TESTS AIR DEFENCE IN MANOEUVRES

"Attacking" Forces Detected In Wide-scale Aerial War Games—King To Weymouth.

LONDON, Aug. 8.—(CP)—Great Britain used 1,300 warplanes and 60,000 air defence soldiers in a gigantic test of air raid precautions tonight and at its conclusion all aircraft "attacking" from the direction of France and Germany had been detected.

Account Of "Battle"
Here is the Air Ministry's account of tonight's "battle": "Hostilities began at 8 p.m. (4 p.m. A.D.T.) The declaration of war between Eastland and Westland was quickly followed by a series of bombing raids by Eastland from Weymouth, north of the Thames Estuary. Eleven sudden raids were made on this territory during the first 40 minutes.

Plans Post Congress Trip On Saturday

Y., Aug. 8 (CP)—President Roosevelt said today he expects to leave his estate here Saturday morning for New York and embark on the United States Cruiser Tuscaloosa for his mother's summer home at Campobello, N.
