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Former Island Man Dies In British Columbia

Word has been received of the death on Thursday, October 26th, of Mr. Duncan Robert Matheson of Pouce Coupe, B.C., son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Donald Matheson, Travellers Rest, P.E.I. He was 58 years old.

Several months ago he underwent a severe operation in a Vancouver hospital. At that time he was visited by his sister, Mrs. Clarence Genasci of Menlo Park, California, who saw him off on his return by plane to Pouce Coupe.

From that time on every hope was held for his complete recovery, until his family heard about three weeks ago that he had re-entered hospital in Dawson Creek, B.C.

Mr. Matheson was well known in Summerside and vicinity, having lived in Wilmot with his family during his youth. He graduated from Summerside High School and attended business college here during which time he gained considerable local reputation as an athlete. When he first moved to the west he resided in Edmonton, where he engaged in the wholesale fruit business and did Government surveying work.

He later acquired a large tract of land at Pouce Coupe in the Peace River district, at a time when this territory was practically uninhabited. The railway came through this district a few years later, and during the war he saw the Alaska Highway built. As one of the earliest settlers, he achieved a position of prominence in the affairs of the now thriving and populated community.

He was active in politics, and recent letters to his family from neighbours reveal that to them he was known as "Councillor Dunc", as his advice was frequently sought by young and old on a variety of subjects. For some time now he has spent the winters in Vancouver, Edmonton and Dawson Creek, and leaves a great many friends in these places as well as Pouce Coupe and Prince Edward Island.

SAINT JOHN, N. B. Nov. 1 — (CP)—Edgar L. Fry, 42, prominent in Air Cadet work, died in hospital today shortly after suffering a heart attack at his home. He was superintendent of the mailing rooms of the Telegraph-Journal and the Evening Times-Globe.

Mr. Fry, with the rank of squadron leader, commanded the 161 Saint John Air Cadet Squadron. He was recently appointed acting commanding officer of the Saint John wing of Air Cadets now in process of formation. He is survived by his wife, two sons and one daughter.

On the 24th's east flank Republic of Korea and U.S. forces still were battling to repulse strong Communist counterattacks.

A U.S. 1st Corps spokesman said a regiment of the U.S. 1st Cavalry Division had relieved the Republic an 8th Division southeast of Ulsan, 30 miles due east of the 24th Division at Kusong. He said the Americans were under strong attacks.

The Republican 8th and 6th Divisions were chopped up in a powerful Red counterattack in a tough triangle marked by Unsan, Onjong and Huichun — some 50 miles south of the Yalu River frontier.

The Red triangle was regarded by intelligence officers in Tokyo as the keystone of the Communist border defence. How many men they had poured into the area was undetermined.

United States." Mrs. Collazzo expressed strong admiration for Puerto Rican Nationalist Party president, Pedro Albizu Campos. Neighbors said he lived in the same old-fashioned Bronx tenement as the Collazzo's until he returned to Puerto Rico about five years ago.

Quiet, Meek Man

The neighbors described Collazzo as a "quiet, meek man." The Collazzo tenement is near 136th Street in the Bronx in New York's uptown section. New York City harbors an estimated 200,000 Puerto Ricans in a teeming Upper Manhattan and Lower Bronx area.

Mrs. Collazzo said her husband never was a Communist. "He was only a member of the Nationalist Party," she told reporters who jammed her small apartment.

"We voted for Roosevelt and Truman because they promised us independence," she went on, "and we did not get it. Roosevelt is dead so we can't blame him."

She said the Blair House shooting did not surprise her. "I'm not surprised at anything these days with revolution going on in Puerto Rico. For every \$1,000,000 Truman gave us, he took back \$2,000,000."

Mrs. Collazzo said she was proud of her husband. She described how he worked as an English-Spanish translator, a typist and a stenographer as well as a polisher of pocketbook frames. He was described, as five feet, six inches tall and slender.

"No, Oscar is no stupid man," she added.
