TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

ALEXANDRIA, July 8—3 p. m. Admiral Seymour is preparing a proclamation to be placarded all over the city, charging authorities with breach of faith in continuing work on the fortifications, and demanding the surrender of the fortifications within twelve hours, and warning the authorities that if they fail to comply with the demand that fire will be opened upon the forts after the expiration of a further period of twenty-four hours. Admiral Seymour has gone on board the Invincible, which will move into the outer harbor along-side the Monarch. The Ministry continue to declare their resolve to resist. They have taken precautions to ensure the safety of the Khedive in the event of troops being landed. Arabi Pasha yesterday was formally summoned to Constantinople by the Sultan, but refused to obey. ALEXANDRIA, July 9—Midnight. All the Consulates are now on board the vessels in the harbor. The English Consul has sent a notice to the other consuls advising them to notify their countrymen to quit Alexandria within 24 hours. NEW YORK, July 9. Steamer "Assyrian Monarch," which arrived yesterday, reported that on Saturday, while off the banks, a large ship ran into and sank a small schooner. Three half-naked men ran across the deck of the schooner, and then sank beneath the waves. LONDON, July 9. Gladstone has decided to accept the decision of the Commons on Trevelyan's amendment to the Repression Bill. Order has been restored in Muscat. Imaum's brother has been pensioned. LONDON, July 10. Notices summoning the reserve have been issued. A railway collision occurred at Cork on Sunday. Thirty persons were injured—twelve, it is expected, will die. THE HAGUE, July 9. Several bodies have been washed ashore from the Dutch ironclad "Adder," reported lost yesterday. MARRIED. On the 13th May, at the residence of the bride's mother, by the Rev. G. M. 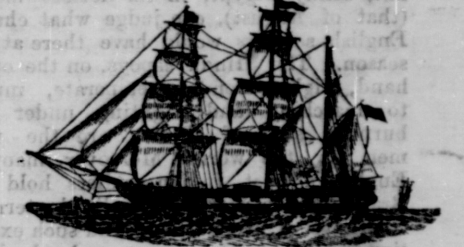
