S'Side School Reports High Enrollment

SUMMERSIDE — Increased enrollment was reported from both the Summerside Elementary school and St. Mary's Academy where grades one to eight registered yesterday at the commencement of the new school term.

School Supervisor Clarence Mercer reported an enrollment of approximately 100 new beginners in grade one classes at the Summerside elementary school, where a total of 900 children are in classes from grades one to eight inclusive.

This morning the students from grades nine through twelve will be enrolled at the Summerside High School.

At St. Mary's Academy there were 758 pupils enrolled during the first day, and more are expected to enroll today. These pupils include girls from grades one to four. Enrollment at this academy is expected to be about 50 more than last year.

The enrollment at the Summerside elementary school is believed to be the largest ever recorded.
