NEWS FROM THE SEAT OF WAR

MILITARY OPERATIONS ARE AT A STANDSTILL.

Roberts is Filling Magazines and Warehouses at Pretoria

Preparatory to a Long Chase after the Retiring Boers—Kruger Still Talking Fight—Salisbury's Congratulations.

LONDON, June 7.—Among the officers of the Thirteenth Imperial Yeomanry captured are the Earl of Leitrim, Earl Longford and Earl Emswore.

SALISBURY'S CONGRATULATIONS

LONDON, June 7.—Lord Salisbury cabled Lord Roberts as follows: "I earnestly congratulate you on this crowning result of your brilliant strategy and the devotion of your gallant soldiers."

FUTURE OPERATIONS.

LONDON, June 7.—The military operations in South Africa are apparently at a stand still for a day or two.

The tired troops of Lord Roberts are resting, and he is filling magazines and warehouses at his new base, Pretoria, preparatory to a long chase after the retreating Boers in the direction of Lydenburg. His cavalry are now probably seeking to intercept Commandant General Botha.

That Pretoria would be defended was apparently given out after a council of war with a view to misleading the British.

The Lydenberg district, into which provisions originally destined for Pretoria have been diverted, and where a cartridge factory had been erected and reserve supplies of all sorts stored, is a volcanic region of fertile valleys, enclosed by great ramparts of precipitous rock, penetrated by narrow, winding passes.

There are herds of cattle in the valleys and there is much native labor available for fortifying.

A despatch to the Daily Telegraph from Newcastle, dated Tuesday, describes the Boers there as an unorganized rabble, without flour, meat or sugar.

Their surrender is only a question of time.

There is a strong feeling throughout the country that striking honors should be conferred upon Lord Roberts without waiting until he returns to England.

KRUGER'S REPLY.

LORENZO MARQUES, June 6.—In answer to a telegraphic inquiry to President Kruger informing him of the offer of one hundred acres of land in America to each burgher, the President replied: "We thank you for this generous offer of land, but the burghers are determined to fight for their own land and independence to the bitter end."

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THE BOERS RETREAT.

NEWCASTLE, June 7.—Great numbers of the enemy still occupy Majuba Hill, Laing's Nek and the Pegwani Range as far east as Eogelbrecht pass. The Ballasberg positions they hold are particularly strong. Should they obstinately refuse to yield and still continue fighting, they will, in all probability, fall back on Lydenburg by way of Ermelo, with prospects of a safe retreat into the almost inaccessible mountains of the Murchison range.

Their task to prevent General Buller's entry into the Transvaal, by way of Volksrust, can only result in failure and unnecessary loss of lives on both sides.

Serious Situation in China

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, June 7.—A special despatch from Shanghai, dated June 6, says: "Members of the majority legations at Peking, including members of the British Legation are sending their families away." It is also said that several prominent Chinese residents are leaving the city.

There is an unconfirmed report that two Russian engineers have been murdered at Ya Chow Fu, northwest of Port Arthur, after their wives had been outraged.

The total damage to the Chinese railways by the Boxers is now estimated at five million dollars.

ANXIETY IN LONDON.

LONDON, June 7.—A great deal of anxiety is shown among the leading financiers of this city owing to the developments in China and the unmistakable signs that a war between Japan and Russia is more than ever a possibility.

The Situation Serious.

LONDON, June 6.—The Daily Express has a despatch from Shanghai, dated Tuesday, which says:

"Russian troops have been ordered from Port Arthur to the neighborhood of Peking to punish the Boxers for killing two Cossacks and wounding two."

A despatch to the Daily Mail from Tien Tsin, dated June 4, says:

"The situation is very serious. The Boxers are approaching Tien Tsin on all sides." The Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Mail telegraphing yesterday says:—"The Boxers are within three miles of Tien Tsin. In addition to the marines the defensive force includes volunteers under the command of Major Higgs, late of the 16th Lancers. The town is practically under arms."

—The Government is wrestling with the difficult problem of Provincial Prohibition when to obtain all that Provincial Prohibition can afford the majority of the people of Charlottetown have only to vote in the Scott Act. The Government's bill has not yet been brought down.

—During the debate last evening on the bill authorizing the issue of \$48,750 in debentures, Mr. Shaw pointed out that owing the gross mismanagement in the various branches of the public service no further power should be granted to borrow money, thereby increasing the debt of the province. Among several instances of the most flagrant misappropriation, he pointed out that in Road District No. 8, King's County, by the Supervisor's return, Albert Dewar has received the sum of \$35 25 for operating the road machine for the season of 1899 for 23 1/2 days, whilst by the return tabled as asked by Mr. Campbell, the same Albert Dewar was paid \$35 25 for work done in operating the road machine for the same year. The C. P. W. here rose and stated that in the statement tabled it was Abner Dewar, the Supervisor, and not Albert Dewar, whose name appeared. But when Mr. Shaw, holding the statement in his hand, pointed out that in said statement the name of Abner Dewar also appeared for attending the road machine in 1899 for \$31.25 the C. P. W. collapsed. "Thus," said Mr. Shaw, "Mr. Albert Dewar has been paid twice for doing the same work." Mr. Shaw called upon the C. P. W. to stand up and explain this matter, but the C. P. W. was driven into a corner and could give no explanation. This is an instance of the way in which the money is squandered and one of the reasons why the Government is yearly going behind hand and is compelled to issue debentures to carry on the ordinary affairs of the province.
