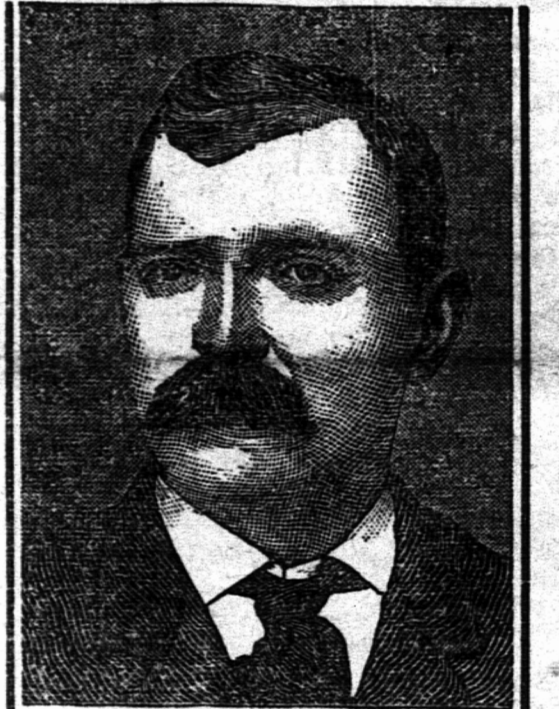

WOLSELEY ASSAILED

**O'Connor Wants Parli-

LONDON, June 21.—John O'Connor,
Parliament member, last night arose in his
seat and called the attention of Parli-
ament to a reference made in the Ulster
Convention by Kane, the Orange grand
master, to Lord Wolseley's statement
that he would call on the people to pre-
vent the dismemberment of the empire.
O'Connor wanted the War Office to find
out Wolseley's position, and objected to
his being employed if he was willing to
rebel against the forces of the Crown.
O'Connor was not answered by the gov-
ernment.

Cleveland On Top.

CHICAGO, June 21.—The Democratic
Convention was called to order at 12.49
to-day. Owen, of Kentucky, is tempo-
rary chairman. The rules governing the
last convention were adopted and after
the roll call of States for selection of
members of the various committees the
Convention adjourned. It is believed it
will adjourn by Thursday. All the papers
now agree that Cleveland will be nomi-
nated without material opposition, with
Grey, of Indiana, as Vice-President.

LONDON, Ont., June 21.—In conse-
quence of the Anglican, Presbyterian,
Congregational and Baptist ministers
withdrawing from the Western Ontario
Bible Society, the Methodists are leaving
the ministerial association.

School Matters in S' side.

SIR,—As we are constantly asked the
reasons for the existing state of affairs in
school matters here, and urged to make a
statement, I will state the facts as briefly
as possible. The only charge now brought
against us is "insubordination" to trustees.
This we both emphatically deny,
and proceed to support this denial by
facts.

First, Mr. McLeod is not now, and
never was our principal. Our school re-
gulations for S' side, approved by the
chief superintendent, has this sentence:
"The teachers in the Eastern and Western
District schools shall have the same auth-
ority as the Principal of the Davies
school." Notwithstanding this, he came
to my room in September last, when I
had everything in working order, and
tried to interfere in the arrangement of
my classes. When I asked for his auth-
ority he alleged that he had got it at a late
meeting of the trustees. This, I was
afterwards informed, was not true. Again
in November he came to Miss Schur-
man's room, interfered in a case of disci-
pline, censured her severely, and removed
two of the pupils against her wish; again
alleging that he had got power to act thus
at a still later meeting of the Board. This
was again told was untrue; while our
regulations under which we have engaged
from year to year still remain unchanged.

I repudiate his right to enter my room
in any capacity unless authorized by the
Trustees, for during the first ten years I
was here he never attempted such a
thing. When he did, it was by my per-
mission at first; but when I found that
each visit was an injury to the pupils, and
that my work was being misrepresented,
with a view of destroying my reputation,
as can be proved by referring to the School
Report of 1890, I began a determined
resistance. When in July last I carried
that report to the Board of Trustees,
asking for justice, they, while unwilling
to refute it themselves in public, or allow
me to do so, disowned its sentiments, re-
gretted its appearance, and promised
amendment in future. Again, when we
went to the December meeting of trustees
to seek redress for the interference in
discipline already mentioned, the chair-
man was directed to inform me that I
should have only myself to deal with in
school matters; but that, as had always
been the custom, the Principal of the
Davies School would still examine and
remove pupils from Miss S's fourth to
his fifth grade. To this she never ob-
jected; but she did object to the manner of
his proceedings; after submitting to what
she and her pupils felt was injustice, and
remonstrating daily without effect, she
told him she must appeal to the Trustees
and ask for justice. This stopped the
proceedings, but the same forenoon the
Chairman came to settle the difficulty.
Miss S. wanted the Trustees to enquire
into the matter, and when he said there
would likely have to be a special meeting
she was satisfied. He then wished me to
allow Mr. McLeod to grade my room,
though he very well knew no one could
grade my class of under 8 years of age
better than myself, as they always under-
stand me, and never understand him. To
my objections he answered that I had
better do it for peace sake, and to last
asked me if for peace favour to himself,
to allow it, and that the "figures if un-
favourable would be suppressed." This
idea of suppression showed me the nec-
essity of appealing to a full Board where
I would certainly have an opportunity of
showing the real state of affairs, and I am
convinced that had matters been fully re-
presented before a full Board from time
to time without suppression, there is in
that Board manhood and justice enough
to see and do the right.
