Blonde Learns To Live Again After Accident

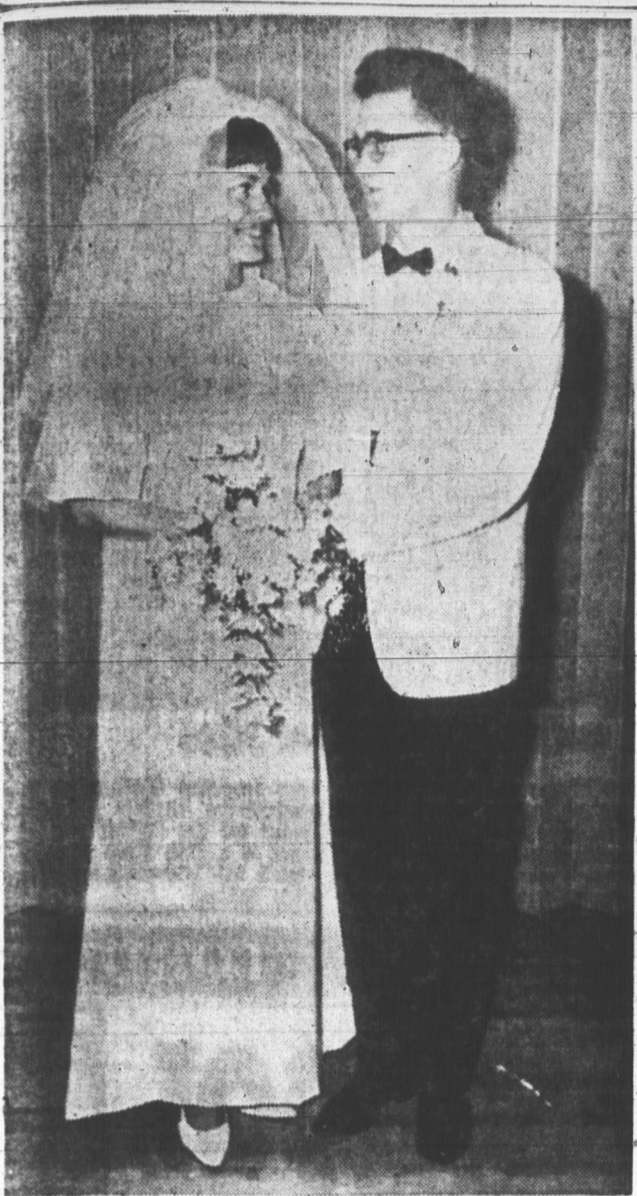
CALGARY (CP) — Blonde Judy Deschamps, 18, thinks it's time she learned to live. "I've been dead long enough," says Miss Deschamps. "It's hard to learn living after you've been hit by a train." Brown-eyed Miss Deschamps says she's on her way now as she can walk again, often without crutches. "And they say I'm through with hospitals." Four years ago she was struck by a train while riding on horseback across a railway bridge to join a parade. Her horse was killed and she plunged 35 feet to the road below, suffering serious head injuries.

She came out of a coma after 99 days—but she couldn't speak and had no control of her arms or legs. Since then, after nearly a dozen operations, she has learned how to talk and walk. "I'm going to live it up. I can finally see and do things. I want to travel and see how people live in different places."
