Hilton Hotels Buy Statler Chain

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP)—Hilton Hotels Corporation today announced it is buying control of the Statler chain in "the largest transaction in the history of the hotel industry."

The announcement by Conrad N. Hilton said the purchase involves 753,000 shares of common stock at a cost of \$50 a share. Purchase of the eight Statler properties now in operation will bring to 26 the number of hotels owned, leased or operated by Hilton Hotels Corp.

Hilton heads a \$160,000,000 system of luxury establishments stretching from Los Angeles to Madrid. Among them is New York's famed Waldorf Astoria.

Power Commission Reports Surplus

FREDERICTON, (CP)—Officials of the New Brunswick Power Commission Tuesday reported a \$121,000 surplus for the 1953-54 fiscal year. Sales totalled \$7,752,700 while gross income amounted to \$7,814,200, a 10.7 per cent increase over the previous year. Operating expenses increased 8.7 per cent to \$7,610,600.

Complete Street Paving Project At Montague

The street paving program for Montague during the current year was completed last week. New streets completed include Central, MacDonald and Queen Streets comprising that portion of the residential area south of the King's County Hospital. Rink Street, from Sparrows Road to River Road, has also been re-coated, thus serving the schools and west residential area.

This program is a continuation of that inaugurated three years ago, and since that time the following streets have been completed and re-coated: MacDonald Avenue, School Street, part of Kennedy Street, River Road and a portion of the Queens Road. It is intended to carry the program further next year, so that all major streets of the town will be paved.

It is a well-constructed wall consisting of piles, ten by ten walings, and four-inch hardwood facing. A cement wall interlocking the steel rods tying in the wharf. The workmen are presently preparing the area for the running of the concrete slab on which the new storage shed will be placed at the south end of the wharf so as to provide a useable wharf area at the north end thus increasing the wharfage space on this important wharf.
