Being on the summit of an iceberg with two men, the berg suddenly began to roll over, and to keep on top they were obliged to run round with it as it turned, like flies running round an orange. Fortunately the berg stopped when it had rolled half over, and they congratulated themselves upon their escape. Advancing north from Upernivik they soon found themselves fast beset in the ice in Melville Bay, remaining in sight of one point of land, called Devil's Thumb, for six weeks. . . . Hard and incessant work, night and day, carried the ships at last through the ever-dreaded pack-ice of Melville Bay, and launched them into the great north water, through which they sailed clear of all obstruction, making their way to the westward for Lancaster Sound and Barrow Bay.
