Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Aug. 18.

It is definitely understood that six or eight representative British farmers will visit Manitoba and the Territories this year. Sir Charles Tupper has completed all arrangements, and the delegates will probably arrive next week.

The Marine Department was notified to-day that the lighthouse at Point Rich, west coast of Newfoundland, had been totally destroyed by fire, and that it is impossible to rebuild it before next year.

Hon. Mrs. Joyce, Vice-President of the United British Women's Emigration Association has arrived here for the purpose of organizing local committees in the leading cities to assist in providing occupation for women and girls sent out to the Provinces. General Laurier's committee last session formally endorsed Mrs. Joyce's scheme and the Department of Agriculture will receive refunds of loans made by the Society, the operations of which will be confined solely to women and girls.

Mr. Schreiber, General Manager of the I. C. R., has ordered an investigation into the charges against the keeper of the dining room in Amherst Station for an insult offered to Rev. Dr. Jordan, a colored minister of Halifax. Mr. Schreiber says if the facts as reported are correct the restaurateur deserves the severest censure.

Dantier, an employee of the Department of Agriculture, was found drowned in the canal this afternoon. Drink did it.

A circular has been issued to collectors of customs in reference to sampling molasses.

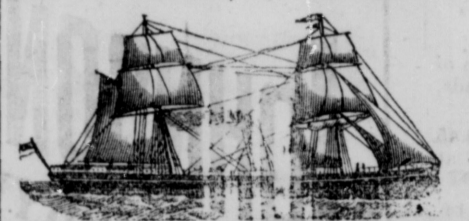
Ages of Man and Wife.

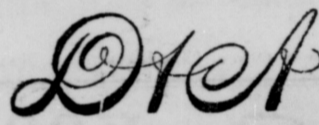

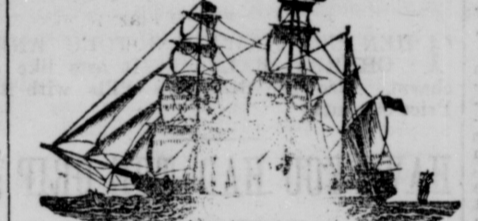
