WASHINGTON (CP) — Congressman Charles Mosher said Friday Postmaster — General Edward Day believes there is not an appropriate year for the publication of a stamp commemorating the 150th anniversary of the signing of the peace treaty between Canada and the United States.

The Ohio Republican said he received a personal letter from the postmaster in which Day stated that it would be a better year for such a stamp since the end of the war in 1918 was signed on Dec. 22, 1914.

Mosher, who has launched a campaign for simultaneous postage stamps in the two countries to commemorate 150 years of peace, said in a statement that Day's suggestion appears logical but that it would be a disappointment to states bordering on the Great Lakes.
