PLANNER'S REPORT RELEASED

Additional Financial Aid Is Necessary For G'town

Former provincial town planner Walter de Silva says additional finance for Georgetown is a prerequisite for the Kings County capital's growth. A planning and housing study of Georgetown by the Halifax architect and town planner was released here yesterday by Municipal Affairs Minister Leo Rossiter. Mr. de Silva points out that new industries when established mean new homes and new commercial outlets. He said however, "major capital expenditures are also involved as a result of the development potential. This means that water and sewer have to be installed, streets have to be paved and lighted, additional classrooms built and teachers hired. In addition, the residents will demand better recreational facilities, police protection, snow clearance and other amenities." According to Mr. de Silva, it is "unquestionable that some form of new housing will be required in Georgetown" and a pre-requisite to the construction of homes will be the provision of a municipal water and sewer system. Mr. de Silva states that a consulting firm has estimated that it would cost approximately \$445,000 to install water and sewers in the developed sections of the town and to extend these facilities along the undeveloped blocks would cost an additional \$75,000, making a total of \$520,000 for the complete project. POWER LIMITED It is pointed out that the town's borrowing power for sewer and water installation is limited by statute to 40 per cent of the total valuation of the town. Mr. de Silva said "according to the 1963 town valuation of \$422,675, the town could borrow \$169,070. "It is not known what the valuation of the new industries might be and how this valuation can be added for borrowing power calculations because of the limitations imposed on taxes from the industries." The town's tax revenue from the two new industries have been limited by agreement to \$1,000 per year up to December 1969 and \$1,500 per year thereafter until the industrial loans from the provincial government by Bathurst Marine Ltd. and Gulf Garden Foods Ltd. have been paid in full. The revenue and expenditure figures for 1963 for the town show receipts of \$14,381 and expenditures of \$14,501. Of the revenue, \$7,400 came from the provincial government in the form of per capita grants. Mr. de Silva concludes that "without additional revenue from other sources, the town has no way to finance and pay for various services that should be provided to attract potential growth." SMALL NUMBER On the matter of future population and housing, Mr. de Silva said "it is claimed that both industries will employ about 700 persons. Out of this a substantial proportion will be hourly paid employees and their annual incomes will range from \$3,000 to \$4,000. The income ranges of the hourly paid would mean that only a small number would qualify for limited dividend housing under the National Housing Act as to rents, average rental under section 16 of the National Housing Act is likely to be in the \$85 per month region for a three bedroom house. "Therefore, that the most logical form of housing for these people and any citizens of the town who require better accommodation would be to build homes under the P.E.I. Co-operative Housing scheme." Mr. de Silva suggested that "some like to live in surrounding communities where there are established amenities, which would take a good length of time to establish in Georgetown. There would be others who would adopt a wait and see attitude and prefer to rent rather than own their homes. "Similarly, private enterprise, while interested, will be cautious before risking investment capital to establish shops, hotels and other enterprises. While this statement would be discouraging to the town and the industrialists, experience shows that home builders and private enterprise take their own cold, calculated time before they start establishing in a new industrial town of this nature."

Theatre Record Set By 'Anne'

A record attendance of 985 was established at Tuesday night's performance of "Anne of Green Gables," at Confederation Centre Theatre. Capacity is 946 but a bus tour of 50 from Ottawa arrived shortly before performance insisted on attending. They sat on chairs placed in the spacious aisles of the theatre opened in 1964. Thus the sparkling new musical comedy adapted by Don Harmon, with music by Norman Campbell from Lucy Maud's story about the Prince Edward Island redhead continues its remarkable day. Only one performance, a Saturday matinee on a beautiful sunny day, has been less than capacity. Don Harmon flew in from Hollywood for the performances. Today's "town criers," the local taxi drivers, are among the best salesmen for the all-Canadian musical. Tourists arriving are touted on its merits. The people of P.E.I. have taken a proprietary interest in it and the new game is "how many times have you seen Anne of Green Gables?" With Johnny Wayne and Frank Shuster in rehearsal for their revue which opens next Tuesday for seven performances, alternating with "Anne of Green Gables," it is expected all theatre records will topple in the final two weeks of the Charlottetown Festival, which closes Aug. 28.

It was reported that recently the machine had been sent to do out-of-town work and had received quite extensive damage. Council passed a motion to eliminate the town tax on ambulances, and agreed to refund such taxes paid for the present year.

Theft Case Adjudged Without Plea

No plea was taken. Adjudged to Aug. 18 for trial was the case of George William Stewart of Charlottetown, who pleaded not guilty to impaired driving. One person who pleaded not guilty to illegal possession of liquor had his case adjudged to Aug. 25, and three others were each fined \$20 and costs or 30 days on similar charges. One person was fined \$10 and costs or 10 days for possession of liquor off an Indian reserve. Two accused were each fined \$20 and costs or 15 days for intoxication.

Georgetown Lions Agree To Sponsor Glaucoma Clinic

Georgetown - Final arrangements were made at a meeting of the Georgetown Lions Club in St. James Hall Tuesday night in regard to the Red Cross blood donor clinics to be held in Cardigan Thursday afternoon and in Montague Thursday night. The Lions Club here is sponsoring the clinics and has made arrangements for the transportation of donors to either clinic. President Joseph E. "Sonny" Johnson presided over the meeting. The Secretary Eric Wood presented the minutes, and the treasurer, Guy Coffin, presented the treasurer's report. Both were adopted. The club heard a report from the president and from Paul Batchelder on a recent meeting held in Charlottetown and attended by the two local Lions on the Glaucoma clinic program. The meeting was attended by Lions clubs from throughout the province. Glaucoma is the second largest disease of the eyes, resulting in blindness. The local club decided it would sponsor a Glaucoma clinic to be held in Georgetown for a large area of Kings County. A number of similar clinics are to be held throughout the province this fall and a definite date for the local clinic will be decided upon in the near future. Lions Johnson and Batchelder will attend a meeting to further discuss this subject in Charlottetown on Aug. 25. Reports were received on the recently held chicken barbecue for Lions and their wives and girlfriends. A report was also given regarding the lions-sponsored dance and canteen held in Gulf Garden Foods Plant on the occasion of their recent opening. A number of bills were moved past, among them a bill for \$25 to cover the costs of eye glasses for two children in the town. This is a program carried out by the Lions through the Canadian National Institute for the Blind. A letter was read from Lions International expressing their sorrow at the passing of William J. Fitzgerald. The letter stated that he will be fittingly remembered, as will other Lions who have passed away during the year, when the next Lions District Convention is held. The club members decided that they would gather on Tuesday night of next week to continue their work of clearing the site for the waterfront park on the west side of the town.
