

# Ethiopian Prince Charges Discrimination In Ottawa

OTTAWA (CP) — A 17-year-old Ethiopian prince has become a drop-out from staid Ashbury College, charging discrimination and ill treatment.

The charges were denied by both the school's headmaster and the prince's Canadian guardian, Social Credit Leader Robert Thompson.

They spoke of the youth's desire to be treated like a prince, disciplinary difficulties, and troubles he had managing pocket money while all his school expenses were paid.

Prince Michael Makonnen, grandson of Emperor Haile Selassie, quit the school at Christmas after more than two years there, saying he was "tired of being a beggar."

Ashbury College is a private boys' school, fashioned after England's most exclusive schools.

# Irish Government Preparing For Renewed I.R.A. Activity

DUBLIN (Reuters) — The Irish government has gripped itself with renewed powers to deal with a threatened outbreak of violence from the outlawed Irish Republican Army.

Rumors are increasing that the I.R.A. is planning a new terror campaign against Ulster — the six counties of Northern Ireland which still form part of Britain.

There have been rumors that arms and ammunition have been smuggled into the republic from the United States.

Police posts along the border have been equipped with short-wave radio transmitters.

The last series of bomb incidents in which 19 persons died was called off by the I.R.A. 10 years ago in the face of growing anger from the Irish.

worked less than their normal hours.

Direct participation of Canadians in the labor force has fluctuated from year to year since the Second World War. Canada came out of the war with 55 per cent of its population aged 14 and over in the labor force, but has not matched that figure since.

The highest proportions in the postwar years were 54.5 per cent in 1949, 54.2 per cent in 1950, and 54.4 last year.

Those are annual averages. Figures issued Wednesday by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics for last month showed a marked climb to 53.3 per cent from 52.9 in January of both 1965 and 1964.

On an annual basis, the low post war figure was 52.9 per cent of the population in both 1954 and 1955.

Last month, of the 6,274,000 employed workers—other than farmers, for whom statistics are difficult to gather—there were 5,689,000 whose jobs entailed working 35 hours or more a week.

In the labor force survey conducted during the week ended Jan. 15, only 5,272,000 of these were reported actually at work for 35 hours or more. This meant 74 out of every 1,000 were not at work, some for economic and some for other reasons.

The 74 compared with 73 in January last year and only 64 in January, 1964.

A close watch is kept on the economic reasons given for not working full-time. These include temporary lay-offs for various causes and workers put on shorter hours to adjust production to demand slack.

An analysis of last month's labor force survey showed the number of workers on short-time hours was 48,000, compared with 54,000 in January, 1965. But the number of work because of lay-offs was higher at 13,000 compared with 11,000 in January last year.

The bureau announced last week in conjunction with the labor department that the labor force in the week ended Jan. 15 was estimated at 7,093,000, of which 559,000 or 5.1 per cent were unemployed. Adjusted for seasonal variations, unemployment last month was 3.5 per cent of the labor force.
