THE NEW TAXATION.

In the course of his speech at Mount Stewart, the Hon. Frederick Peters condemned the taxation of enterprise, industry and thrift; and in the course of his speech when seconding the address, Mr. Arthur Peters commended the principles of taxation laid down by Adam Smith, viz.: "Equality, Certainty, Convenience, and Economy."

THE ESTIMATES.

The tabling and passage of "The Estimates" is, so long as the present Government is in power, a mere matter of form. Last year the estimates were exceeded by well nigh \$60,000. There is no guarantee that they will not be exceeded during this year or in any future year in which the present unscrupulous party have a majority in the Legislature.

Mr. A. J. Macdonald claimed that the Government had no right to raise a special revenue in this way for the maintenance of the insane and poor.

Hon. Mr. Peters moved that the clause stating that no tax be imposed on estates for charitable or religious purposes be amended by adding the words "within the Province."

Hon. Mr. Peters moved that after the word "sister," in subsection 3 of clause 4, the words "brother's child or sister's child" be added.

Hon. Mr. Peters said section five was the important section of the bill, as it imposed the tax, following exactly the Ontario and New Brunswick act.

AGAINST THE TAX.—At the city council meeting on Tuesday evening Councilor Hines gave notice at the next meeting of the Board he would move a resolution to the following effect:—Whereas, Notice has been given to this council by Councilor Duce that it is his intention to move at the next regular meeting, or at an earlier meeting to be called for such purpose, that an application be made to the Legislature now in session for an amendment to the Act of Incorporation to enable this Council to impose a tax on persons selling intoxicating liquors within this city; and

Whereas, it is currently reported that a majority of this Council approve of such a scheme. Therefore Resolved that this Council does not favor the system of raising a revenue from the taxation or licensed sale of intoxicating liquors.
