

Expo Project For 67 Being Planned At P.W.C.

A special project for Expo 67 is being carried out at Prince of Wales College.

It all started when a decision was reached many months ago to have a special pavilion at the big fair to show the whole world the story of the struggle of the Canadian Indians to adapt to a modern technological society while preserving the traditional moral and spiritual values of their forefathers.

To make the whole plan authentic, Indians of all tribes were called into discussion and from then on the project planners never looked back and now the pavilion is a fact.

INDIAN STORY

However, it had to be properly staffed and among those required were to be 12 Indian maidens to act as hostesses to tell visitors from all over the globe the Indian story from the days of bitter warfare with the whites to the present time of peaceful co-existence and co-operation within the Canadian nation.

There were 280 applicants for the 12 posts and one of the fortunate chosen girls was Marie Knockwood, 19, of Scotchfort, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Teddy Knockwood, descendants of the Miemac Tribe who once roamed the Maritimes.

MARIE HAPPY
"It is wonderful", a happy Marie said yesterday as she told how thrilled she was at being

selected and having a chance to see Montreal for the first time and meet people from all over the world.

Since the fair is being held in Montreal, the heart of French Canada, bilingualism is a virtue that almost becomes a necessity. Marie Knockwood had studied French in school but only at the Grade eight level "and I guess I wasn't very good at it then", she admits.

CAME TO RESCUE
The co-operation between federal and provincial authorities came to the rescue, though, and the Director of Visual Aids to Education here approached Professor Robert LeClair of the French Department at Prince of Wales College and asked him to give Marie what almost amounts to a 'crash' course in conversational French. It is hard work, but Mr. LeClair said she is an apt pupil who works hard. She gives her six hours of instruction each week and she spends at least ten more hours a week in home study.

OFF TO MONTREAL
Just after the first of the year Miss Knockwood will go to Montreal for four months training prior to the opening of Expo 67. This will be for a course including a refresher program dealing with Indian history and culture. She will return to The Island when the big exposition site closes next October.

St. Paul's Credit Union Shows Continual Growth

SUMMERSIDE — A rapid growth in membership and assets since figures were compiled in 1946, was shown in the annual report of the St. Paul's Credit Union Limited in Summerside.

At that time, there were 174 members, and today that figure is more than tripled with a total of 633 members. Assets, meanwhile, have gone from \$12,243.16 in 1946, to the present day assets of \$473,770.40.

The statistics were released for

the year ending September 30 by treasurer, Fred Gallant.

Assets climbed into the \$100,000 figure in 1953, and a steady climb since then brought the total into the \$200,000 category in 1962.

Assembly-Line Homes Shown In Montreal

MONTREAL (CP)—A series of four-bedroom houses built entirely on the assembly line were previewed here for government officials and the press in Montreal and Toronto.

The homes which contain two bathrooms and come entirely furnished and ready for occupancy are expected to sell for about \$10,000 when initial production starts in the fall of 1967.

This price does not include cost of the lot, basement, garage, carport or fences are all optional extras.

The houses are to be produced by Alcan Design Homes Ltd., a subsidiary of the Aluminum Company of Canada.

"What we have done is adapt the sophisticated assembly-line techniques perfected by the automotive industry to the manufacture of a home," says J. C. Neely, president of ADH.

Mr. Neely said assembly-line techniques make substantial cost savings possible over existing methods of construction.

"The end product also reflects the fact that by factory assembling the homes we can exercise complete control of building materials and their assembly."

SEEKING TO FILL GAP
ADH hopes the new, cheaper homes will fill a gap in the consumer market caused by a shortage of mortgage money and rising construction costs which in the first nine months of 1966 have caused a drop in home building of 19.6 per cent from the corresponding period in 1965.

To date four different models of the new homes have come off Alcan assembly lines—each with different interior and exterior designs and different furnishings.

Until all plans are complete the prototype homes are located in private research areas not open to the public.

Mr. Neely said that in building the homes, aluminum has been used only where it has become an acceptable building material, such as for siding, windows and such, the flat surfaces under the eaves.

COME IN TWO SECTIONS
Existing model sizes vary from 1,104 square feet of area to 1,366 feet. The homes are assembled in the factory and shipped to their chosen sites in two sections which are then joined together on their foundations.

Each includes three or four bedrooms, a living room, dining room, fully equipped kitchen, two bathrooms, all furniture necessary for occupancy, and wall-to-wall carpeting.

The homes are engineered to withstand a wide range of weather conditions and are built to conform with National Building Code requirements.
