The chief gainer by this policy, of course, was Nasser, who continues to draw fat subsidies from both Washington and the Kremlin.

Egypt, it is noted, has received more Soviet aid than any other neutral state. On this occasion, Mr. Khrushchev, after seeing the Aswan Dam and setting off ceremonial charges, will visit the canal.

Recalling Agricola The success of last week's music festival is a reminder of the fact that it was the late Mr. Blythe Hurst, senior, through his weekly column in The Guardian, who first suggested a festival of this kind for Prince Edward Island, as well as the adoption of the Lady's Slipper as the floral emblem of the Province.

Mr. Hurst, who died in 1950, wrote under the pen name of Agricola, and his articles were widely read at home and abroad. A native of Northumberland, England, he came to this Province in 1910 and taught at Harrington School, Winsloe Road School and later at Mount Herbert Orphanage. It was at this time that he began his contributions to this newspaper, which he continued for many years.

He was the Island's most authoritative botanist and naturalist, and was also well versed in geology, history, music and the arts generally. His work on the flora of Prince Edward Island became a standard text.

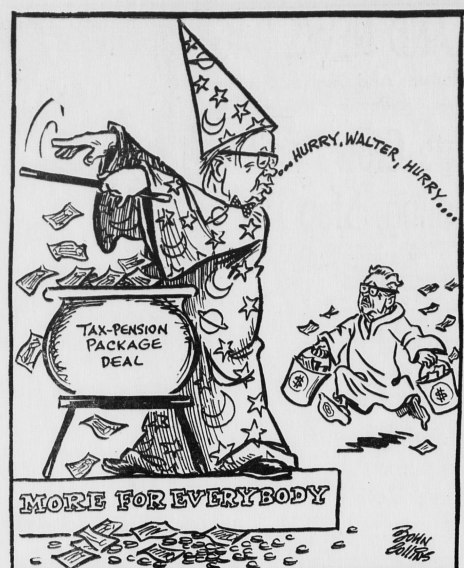
Mr. Hurst had a beautiful garden with flowers in full bloom, which he tended lovingly until his last illness. Much of his time was occupied in replying to correspondence received from all parts of the continent. At the time of his death, at eighty-nine, an Ottawa admirer wrote in, offering to contribute towards a scholarship as a memorial to a man whom he regarded as one of Canada's most distinguished writers.

Nothing came of this proposal, but it reflected prevailing opinion at the time. And we have no doubt that, among our older readers, Agricola's name is still held in fond remembrance. We take this opportunity of saluting his memory, and of recalling the part he played in enriching our cultural heritage.

THE SORCERER'S APPRENTICE THE NORTHWEST PASSAGE Could Be A Part-Time Panama Canal

Can the winding waterways of the Arctic serve in summertime as a commercially useful "Panama Canal"? The purpose of the 1964 trip, as described by expedition leader Scott Alexander, is "to prove that the passage is ice-free long enough and late enough in the life summer that normal ocean-going ships can use it as a shorter toll-free route between the East and West Coasts of Canada."

It is also hoped that establishment of a safe water route will help the Canadian North, whose mineral resources have scarcely been tapped. The 1964 expedition will make use of reconnaissance reports from government aircraft in order to stay clear of the ice.
