And be it enacted, That all Indictments and Informations against any Person or Persons for or in respect of any offences against the Provisions of this Act, and all Proceedings for the recovery of any Penalty incurred or alleged to have been incurred against any Person or Persons under this Act, shall and may be proceeded with and determined before such and the same Courts, Magistrates, and Justices of the Peace, and in such the same manner, and with and under and subject to all such and the same Rules, Provisions, Conditions, and Restrictions, and and the like Regulations as to the Application and Distribution of the Penalties recovered, as in the case of any Indictment or Informations preferred, or Proceedings taken for or in respect of any Offence committed against or for the recovery of any Fines, Penalties, or Forfeitures incurred under any Act now in force for the prevention of Smuggling, or relating to the Customs, or to Trade or Navigation.

IV. And be it enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Commissioners of Customs to direct any Officer of Customs to institute and prosecute such Proceedings as are authorized by this Act against any Person or Persons for or in respect of any Offence or Offences by him or them committed, or alleged to have been committed against the Provisions of this Act; provided, nevertheless, that, except in such cases, the direction or consent of the said Commissioners shall not be necessary or required in order to the preferring, prosecuting, proceeding with, or determining any Informations under this present Act, any thing in such Acts as aforesaid to the contrary in any wise notwithstanding.

V. And be it enacted, That all Warrants of Justices of the Peace for recovering any Penalty inflicted by this Act shall be drawn in the Form or to the Effect in the Schedule to this Act annexed; and that no such Warrant shall be held void by reason of any Defect in such Warrant, nor shall any Party be entitled to be discharged out of Custody on account of any such Defect, provided it be alleged in the said Warrant that the said Party has been convicted of any Offence against this Act, and provided it shall appear to the Court or Judge before whom such Warrant shall be returned, that such Conviction proceeded upon good and valid grounds.

VI. And be it enacted, That this Act shall continue in force until the First day of May, One thousand eight hundred and forty-five.

VII. And be it enacted, That this Act may be amended or repealed by any Act to be passed during the present Session of Parliament.

The following loyal Address was intended to have been presented to His Excellency the Lieut. We Her Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the South West District Branch of "The Highland Society of Prince Edward Island," availing ourselves of the favorable opportunity afforded us by your Excellency's visit to our part of the country, beg leave to approach your Excellency with the cordial avowal of our attachment to the person of our gracious Sovereign, our submission to the laws, and devotion to our glorious constitution, which, spreading its benign influence to every clime, the British subject in far distant regions, sheltering like ourselves under its covering wings, can repose in peace and smile at despots. A cold-blooded attempt at murder, although made on an individual ranking in the very lowest grade of society, has ever called forth the abhorrent feelings of mankind; but when an attempt has been made to break into the tabernacle of life of a tempt young, amiable and unoffending female, and see the beloved Sovereign of a mighty empire, words are inadequate to convey the idea of the horror that must prevail on such a violation of the laws of Nature, and of Nature's God. We can, therefore, only express our gratitude to the Almighty, who stretched forth his arm to a nation's tears. We beg to congratulate your Excellency on this happy intervention, and earnestly pray, that the same ruling power may continue to protect a life so precious; and that the Prince, her son, may perpetuate, in unbroken succession, the race of his illustrious ancestors, under whose paternal sway our fatherland has attained to a pitch of power and glory unparalleled in history.

In addressing your Excellency, as Chief of a Society connected with the great, and greatly benevolent parent Institution, "The Highland Society of London," we, an humble Branch, can with pride remind your Excellency that the Tartan of the mountains from whence we hail has ever waved gloriously in the front of every battle-field, where, at freedom's call, the claymore left its sheath; and we, emulating the spirit of our fathers, tender freely and fearlessly our energies and our lives to your Excellency, as our Chief, to lead us on to where emergency and fate may demand them, in support of the Banner of Britain, when unfurled for Briton's rights;—and in such a cause, should the Tartan be stained, it will, as heretofore, when worn by Caledonians, be by the blood of foes—not by dishonor.

To your Excellency, your amiable lady and family, we wish every happiness that health, accompanied by prosperity in all your undertakings, can give; that your Excellency's Government may be undisturbed by foreign foe or domestic feud; that during your Excellency's stay amongst us, you may have the gratification of seeing the wilderness converted into a smiling field, by the hand of sober, honest industry; and when it shall please our royal mistress to call you from hence to the exercise of more important duties, that your Excellency may leave our Island with friendly feelings towards its Inhabitants, and with the pleasing conviction, that they are not unworthy of having the protecting folds of the "Meteor Flag" of Britain waving over them.

Connected myself with the Highlands, I art well aware of the fidelity and courage of your ancestors; and their intrepidity will, when necessary, be rivaled by your own, in defence of our gracious Sovereign and Constitution.

For your kind personal wishes towards myself and my family, I pray you to accept my heartfelt thanks; and allow me to assure you, that the reception which I have recently experienced throughout the Island has warmly attached me to the inhabitants, whose prosperity, in every class, it shall be my constant endeavor to advance.

The following Despatch from the Right Hon. Lord Stanley, to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, appeared in the Royal Gazette of Tuesday last:—

DOWNING STREET, July 14, 1842.

No. 27. Sir;

I have had the honor to receive your Despatches, Nos. 33 and 34, of the 22nd of May, 1842, enclosing an Address and Petition to the Queen, from the House of Commons from the House of Assembly, and a Petition to the House of Commons from the subject of the state of the Colony, adopted by the House of Assembly. These documents relate to the two questions of the rights of the Grantees of Crown Land and to the Fishery Reserves in Prince Edward Island.

I have laid the Address and Petition before the Queen. The Petition to the House of Commons has been presented to that House.

In obedience to Her Majesty's commands, I have to acquaint you, for the information of the House of Assembly, that Her Majesty's Executive Government must decline to interfere any further in the question in debate between the Grantees of Lands in
