AN INCREASE ALL ROUND.—Moncton's trade returns for February, this year, show increases as compared with the same month last year as follows: Exports from \$3,253 to \$3,438; imports from \$37,373 to \$80,434, duty collected from \$15,440.77 to \$26,151.44.

NO WONDER.—The Moncton Transcript says: On Sunday evening, about 7 o'clock, two men called at Estey's drug store and asked for soda water. The clerk maintained consciousness long enough to remark that it was out of season and then fainted away.

DON'T WANT WATTS.—Charles Watts, editor of Secular Thought, who lectured in Charlottetown on several occasions, is having some trouble with the authorities at Brantford, Ont. It appears that he hired the Town Hall in which to lecture, but the Council refused to fulfil the contract.

LECTURE.—At Oddfellows Hall, Summerside, last evening, Rev. Fred. E. J. Lloyd delivered a lecture on "Oddfellowship" before a large and appreciative audience. A hearty vote of thanks, moved by Rev. C. F. Lowe and seconded by Stipendiary Magistrate McQuarrie, was tendered the learned lecturer.

KING'S COLLEGE CENTENARY.—The preparations for celebrating the Centenary of King's College are going on with great success. Invitations are being sent out to a large number of distinguished persons abroad, some of whom have already promised to be present.

THE FUR TRADE.—Christopher McDonald, of Antigonish, N. S., was in Halifax last week with a large lot of furs of animals got in Guysboro, Antigonish and Cape Breton counties this winter. There are 381 foxes (one a beautiful silver grey fox, worth \$80) 419 muskrats, 8 otter, 13 raccoons, besides lynx, wild cats, minks, etc.

LECTURE.—The Scottish address this evening in the Y. M. C. A. Hall, by the Rev. D. Sutherland, a Scotchman recently from the land of the heather, will, we feel sure, be a rich treat for the large audience who will doubtless go to hear, for the first time, one of our best platform speakers. Subject.—A talk about Scottish life and humor.

DIPHTHERIA'S RAVAGES.—There were more deaths from diphtheria in Halifax in the month of January, 1890, than in any other Canadian city. Montreal, with a population of 210,000, lost only 10 by diphtheria; while St. John escaped with only one death from that disease. Halifax's record was 15.

AROUND THE WORLD.—It is stated that George Francis Train left Boston on the midnight express, on Monday, for a trip around the world, which he expects to complete in sixty days. New York will be his first stopping place. From thence he will go directly to Tacoma and thence across the Pacific Ocean to China.

THE MEANEST YET.—Sturgis, Dak., Record: A man from Bare Butte Valley lost his pocket book containing \$350, which was found by a man of Elk Creek. A month later, upon learning who was the owner, he returned the same, and the owner was very thankful, but demanded interest for the use of the money for that time. Judgment was given for \$1.45 and costs.

THOSE PICTURES.—Both the St. John Progress and the Halifax Mail publish alleged likenesses of Mrs. Robert T. Weeks. We have not seen the number of Progress containing the illustration; but if its likeness is not any more like the original than that which appears in the Mail, Mrs. Weeks has good ground for a libel suit.

FAT CATTLE.—Says the Annapolis Spectator: We have the authority of the "weigher" at Kingston for saying that Mr. R. A. Dodge, Salem, placed a pair of fat cattle on the scales Tuesday last that tipped the beam at 4150 pounds. This is a remarkably heavy weight, and Mr. Dodge has the reputation of producing many such cattle. Mr. Dodge also placed a pair of two-year-old steers, after driving them five miles, that weighed 2050 pounds. This, too, is a fine weight for two-year-olds, and argues well for the beef-producing facilities of the Valley.

MEAN AND FALSE.—The Island Guardian says:

"The EXAMINER announces that the University of Laval (Roman Catholic) has conferred the degree of Doctor of Laws, on E. J. Hodgson, Esq., Q. C., of this city. If we remember right Mr. Hodgson's father bequeathed a sum of money to this institution."

The meanness of the whole of this paragraph is apparent; and the statement contained in the last sentence is absolutely untrue—as the editor of the Guardian could have learned by walking across the street to the Probate office. Religious weeklies should be a little careful about their facts.

BEAUTIFUL PEN WORK.—A sample of beautiful pen drawing, lettering and flourishing done by Master Ewen Cameron was shown at the Times office yesterday and will be exhibited at Moss & Sons' jewelry store. It consists of the Lord's Prayer, with a portrait of Our Saviour copied from a steel engraving as a centre piece. Master Cameron got his ideas of this class of work in the Charlottetown Business College. A sample of his work was shown in the art gallery at the Maritime Exhibition in Moncton last fall, but the piece above referred to is far superior to anything previously done by him. The young man possesses undoubted talent in this direction, and is worthy of every encouragement. —Moncton Times.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, March 6.

In the House of Commons to-day, Mr. Laurier brought up the matter of Bremner's furs and Mr. Lister's motion for the committee of inquiry.

Sir John Macdonald said he was willing that a committee be appointed, but would not accept the committee named in Mr. Lister's motion.

After some discussion, it was agreed that a committee should be named to-morrow.

Sir John Thompson introduced a bill authorizing the transfer to the provinces of proprietary rights in forebays of harbors and rivers now claimed to be held by the Dominion, and the jurisdiction over which has been in dispute with the Provinces.

The House then went into committee on Sir John Thompson's bill representing bills of exchange, cheques and promissory notes.

After recess, when a motion was made to go into supply, Mr. Laurier moved his resolution censuring the Government for spending money upon the Harvey and Salisbury railway project without authority from Parliament.

After a long discussion, in which Sir John Macdonald, Sir Richard Cartwright, Sir John Thompson, Mr. Davies, Mr. Kenny, Mr. Kirk, Mr. Jones, Gen. Laurier and Mr. Mullock took part, the House divided on the amendment, which was defeated—98 to 61.

The House went into supply and passed some of the public works estimates.

A Protest Made.

LONDON, March 6.

Delegates from Oxford, Cambridge, Durham, Dublin and Victoria Universities, the Academy of Music and College of Music, today called upon Lord Knutsford, Secretary of State for the Colonies, and presented a protest against Trinity College, Toronto, granting music degrees in Great Britain. Lord Knutsford replied that Trinity College appeared to have exceeded the powers conferred upon it by its charter and said he would take the opinion of the Crown lawyers on the subject.

A Railway Smashup.

BUFFALO, N. Y., March 6.

On the Lake Shore Railway, near Hamburg, a passenger train running very fast broke in two. The front part, consisting of engine, tender, smoker and two day coaches was quickly brought to a standstill, but the rear half, composed of five heavy Pullmans, crushed into the second day coach. Four persons are reported killed, and one fatally injured.

The Orange Bill.

MONTREAL, Mar. 6.

The French press has expressed strong dissatisfaction with the passage of the Orange bill by the Commons, but strong hope is entertained that the measure will be killed in the Senate.

A Rousing Reception.

SMITH'S FALLS, Ont., Mar. 6.

The Grand Orange Lodge of Ontario, now in session here, yesterday gave a rousing reception to Grand Master Clarke Wallace, M.P., the champion of the Orange incorporation act.

Died From His Injuries.

HALIFAX, N. S., Mar. 6.

Conductor McDonald, who was injured on an Intercolonial train at Windsor Junction a few days ago, died to-day. He had been in the employ of the Intercolonial for a quarter of a century.

Wants to Borrow.

HALIFAX, Mar. 6.

Dartmouth wants to borrow \$110,000 to establish a ferry of its own with Halifax.

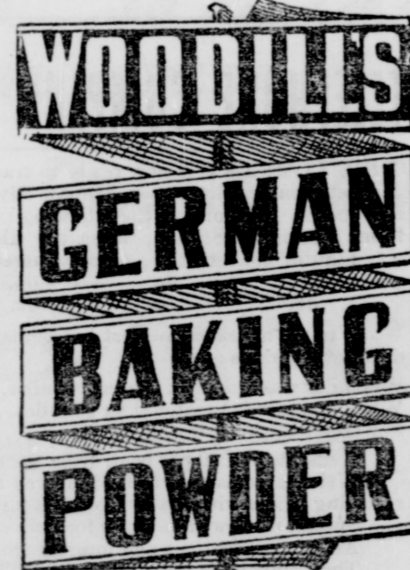
