The ocean steamers which left England on Thursday carried four thousand settlers for Canada. The Loretto Convent at Lindsay, Ont., was destroyed by fire on the 24th inst. Loss \$40,000. Mr. Watt will be remembered by many as an intelligent, genial, and exceedingly active man, delighting to devote himself to every good work. Some years ago he removed with his family to Michigan in the United States, and latterly resided in Texas. Since the death of his wife, shortly after their removal to Texas, he had been in failing health, and on the 31st of March last, peacefully entered into rest. THE Quebec *Chronicle* says it is rumored that the Laval University is about to close its doors, and the affairs of Lower Canada's greatest hall of learning, which boasts of a royal charter from Queen Victoria, are to be wound up. It is said the college authorities have not been impelled to take the course upon which they have decided through any ecclesiastical troubles or differences. The cause is entirely due to lack of funds to carry on affairs as they ought to be carried on. The professors of Laval had an interview with Monsignor the Apostolic delegate in Montreal on Tuesday, lasting more than two hours and a half. They inform the University prelate that if for any reason the University should close its doors, they would continue to give independently the course of lectures which they now deliver.

He was momentarily becoming more ferocious, the men had great difficulty in placing a slip-knot on his neck, and thus partly strangled him. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] Most Destructive Cyclone.

DAYTON, OHIO, April 28. Shortly before five o'clock yesterday afternoon, the most destructive cyclone ever known in this part of the country passed over the southern part of Montgomery and Greene cities, devastating everything in its course. It was fully an eighth of a mile wide. The loss of life must be great. The estimated loss of property is \$1,400,000. Only meagre reports have been received as yet.

Dynamite and Daggers.

LONDON, April 28. A despatch from Paris to the *Standard* says an Irishman states that the emissary of the Clan-na-Gael has arrived in Paris from New York, to buy a cruiser, proved with torpedoes. Tynan is expected in Paris shortly, where he and McCaffrey will direct a dynamite and dagger campaign.

Ferry's Egyptian Policy.

LONDON, April 28. The *Cologne Gazette* says that President Ferry will demand binding pledges of England to renounce the idea of annexing or establishing a protectorate over Egypt, and if England refuses to give pledges, France will abstain from the Egyptian Conference.

A Reign of Terror.

LONDON, April 28. A telegram from Berber says it is impossible to communicate with Gen. Gordon. The whole country is in rebellion. The tribes threaten Berber, and everyone is starting for Cairo.

Damaging Fires.

PHILIPSBURG, PA., April 28. Extensive forest fires prevail in this section, doing enormous damage.
