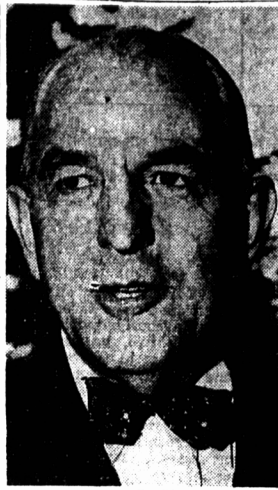

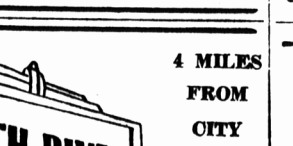

Interesting Discussions At Teachers Convention At Mt. Stewart Yesterday

The many changes made during the past year in the school curriculum were discussed by Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie, assistant director of education, at the closing sessions of the two-day fall convention of the Prince Edward Island Teachers' Federation, held yesterday at Mt. Stewart. After a brief talk concerning the three committees which have been set up to decide on new texts for language, science and arithmetic, a discussion period was held.

A demonstration by Mr. Derrill MacGuigan, B.A., M.Ed., Queen Square School teacher, and a discussion on intermediate arithmetic was well received by the attending teachers. It was followed by a five-minute talk on the Junior Red Cross by Miss Marie Bowness. A question box was then conducted with Mr. MacKenzie and Mr. Gordon Rice answering the queries.

In the afternoon, a demonstration on physical education, consisting of various games and activities which could be carried on in and out of the classroom, was conducted by Miss Estelle Bowness. A record of the resolutions was then given by sister Clair Therese, one of them being that the study of hygiene for examinations purposes be completed in Grade IX.

In the business portion of the meeting, Mr. Warren McGuirk was selected by the nominating committee as president of the federation and Mrs. George Handrahan as vice-president. The secretary is Miss Mable O'Brien. It was decided that another two-day convention be held in the coming year.
