

Saints Win Maritime Football Crown

Millionaires In 3-1 Win Over Miners To Move Within Game Of Atlantics

GLACE BAY, Nov. 9.—(CP)—Sydney Millionaires, playing their defensive best, moved to within one game of first-place Halifax Atlantics when they downed Glace Bay Miners 3-1 Saturday in a regular Maritime Major Hockey League game here.

Over-taking Miners, the Money-men took a 2-1 lead in the first period, added another in the second, and were satisfied to stalk the blue line in the third.

Pop Backor scored Miners only tally 46 seconds after the first whistle, on a play with Bill McCracken and Johnny Myketyk. The red-shirts held the lead until Nick Hill scored nine minutes later. Phil Dalgleish and Bill Tyshko assisted.

Big Dunc MacIntyre scored the winner four minutes later on a rush with Reg Campbell.

Bill McDonagh added the insurance goal at 6:20 of the second period when he clicked on a three-way passing play with Campbell and Freddie Weaver.

The third period was scoreless as Millionaires contented themselves with playing a five-man defence. Nick Pidsodny was busy in their period, turning back 12 shots, of which at least five ap-

peared sure goals.

Red Wings Snap Out Of Slump To Defeat N.Y. 3-1

DETROIT, Nov. 9.—(AP)—Detroit Red Wings snapped out of their worst slump in years with a 3-1 National Hockey League victory over New York Rangers before 10,771 fans here tonight.

It was the first victory for fourth-place Detroit in four games and only the second for the defending champions in eight. The injury-weakened Rangers have lost nine of 13 and haven't won in six.

Rookie Lou Jankowski, veteran Ted Lindsay and sophomore Glen Skov scored for Detroit on a goal-a-period clip.

The Rangers matched this for the first stanza on Ed Kullman's tally, but could not keep it up.

It was a wild game and referee Bill Chadwick called only five penalties, none of which figured in the scoring.

Jankowski was first to beat Lorne Worsley, the rookie who returned to the New York nets again as coach Bill Cook decided

to give injured Charley Rayner more rest. Jankowski got his first league goal on a quick slap at Lindsay's rebound off the goal post.

Kullman offset it by poking a short shot through Terry Sawchuk's legs. But in the next two periods New York had nothing to offset Lindsay's drive over the prone Worsley for the winning goal or for Skov's nifty deflection of Red Kelly's high liner.

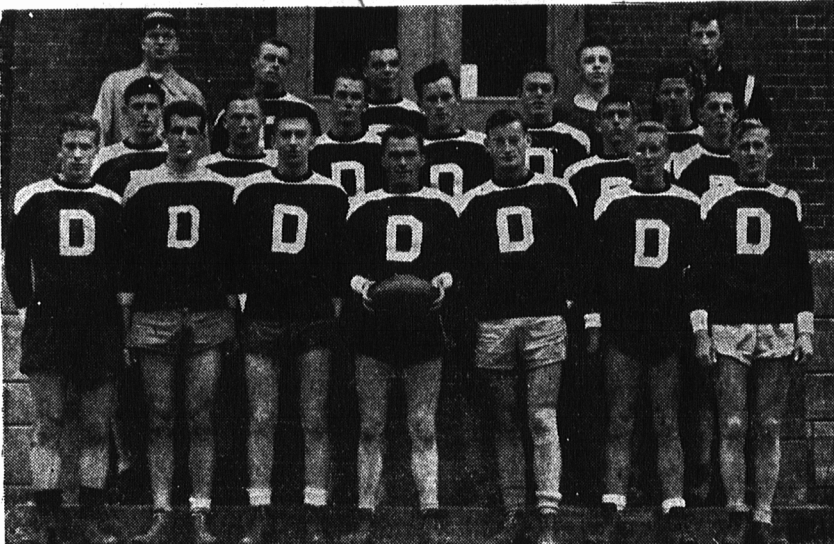

The aggressive Boston centre insured a Bruins' triumph with two tallies in the second session following a scoreless opening period. Mackell was assisted on both of those goals by Joe Klukay and Jerry Toppazzini.

Mackell added his other goal with help from defenceman Bob Armstrong and Klukay at 4:46 of the third and Boston's Jack McIntyre made it 4-0 with an assist by defenceman Bill Quackenbush at 12:06.

Chicago's coach Sid Abel accounted for the Hawks' lone tally at 13:25 in combination with Jimmy Peters and Jim McFadden

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Defeat Mount Allison 4-0 In Bitterly Fought Game At Sackville

SACKVILLE, Nov. 8.—(Special)—Saint Dunstan's University won its first Maritime Intercollegiate Football Championship here Saturday afternoon by defeating Mount Allison University 4-0 in one of the most bitterly fought games ever played in Maritime intercollegiate circles.

The powerful Saints, who shouldered their way through most of their opposition with sweeping ground attacks this season, took to the air to defeat the Allisons as fullback Jack Reardon counted on two penalty kicks to give the Saints their margin of victory.

And for the A. J. MacAdam coached Saints it was a sweet victory. For seventy minutes they battled tooth and nail with the determined Mounties in a dog-eat-dog struggle that thrilled the close to 3,000 spectators who thronged along the sidelines cheering on their favorites. Approximately 800 of the fans were Saints supporters.

The win climaxed a terrific season of football for S. D. U. During the fall they humbled St. F. X. and Acadia by top-sided scores and twice defeated Mount Allison.

The Saints and Mounties went into the final struggle deadlocked for first place in the Maritime Intercollegiate League and they played that way throughout the game with the only noticeable difference being Reardon's toe.

This was a game marked by brilliant kicking and close playing. Every man was marked in this game which featured few half line runs but which showed some bone crushing tackling and outstanding work by the rival sets of forwards.

Play started back early in the fourth through the contest and the issue was in doubt until the final whistle. The Mounties tried desperately to get back in the running in the last minutes but the battling Saints held them in centre-field until the end.

ball struck for longer gains. They followed up strongly on their kicks and their halfline took advantage of any breaks that showed in the Mounties armour to streak through for valuable yardage.

The Saints kicked off to start the game and carried the play into the Mounties territory in the opening minutes. They were soon forced back in their own territory by a determined Mount Allison attack and only a hard tackle by Clarence MacDonald on his own 15 yard line prevented the Mounties from scoring.

MacDonald's tackle knocked the ball out of the Mount Allison ball carrier's arms into the hands of Lloyd Gaudet. The fleet wingman kicked the ball up to centre field and followed up fast to nail Mounties fullback Jim MacDonald and relieve the pressure.

Shortly afterwards hard tackling Charlie Chevrefils of the Saints was badly dazed after being struck by a knee on the head as he made a flying tackle on an opposing ball carrier.

The Mounties had the first chance to count on a penalty kick early in the half when the Saints were penalized for an infraction on their 25 yard line. The kick was almost from directly in front of the bars but Les Davies, their ace kicker, missed on the attempt.

For the rest of the half play was almost even. The Mounties scrim outplayed the Saints but so fast did the Saints forwards break that the Mounties usually lost ground. Time after time the S. D. U. forwards nailed the Mounties for losses of ten yards.

But the Mounties did get their half line away on several occasions. They worked well but they were so closely marked that they never made a dangerous gain. Scott Coyle in particular made several outstanding tackles on opposing half liners.

The Saints were pressing in the Mounties end when they got their first real break of the game. The Mounties kicked to relieve pressure and the ball landed in winger Paul Jay's arms. Jay raced 35 yards down the sidelines in the most brilliant run of the afternoon and had only one man to beat when he was pulled down five yards from the line.

A series of scrums followed and the Mounties began to force the Saints back from their line. They were penalized, however, inside their own 25. Reardon took the kick from the left of the bars and about 30 yards away to make the score 2-0. Time of the score was 32:58.

During the first half the Mounties scrim outplayed the Saints 13-6. Saint Dunstan's were awarded seven penalty kicks and Mount Allison six.

Second Half

The Mounties pressed into Saint territory early in the second half. They came within five feet of the line on one occasion but could not crack through the stubborn defenses.

The Saints forced the play back to centre field and then followed a play which could have changed the outcome of the game. Yeardon of Mount Allison obtained the ball from a scrum and broke through with only Reardon to beat. Jack outguessed him and made a beautiful tackle to save the game for the local collegians.
