Old-Age Pension Scheme Failing To Pay Its Way

OTTAWA, (CP)—The government's old-age pension scheme appears to be unable to pay its way. A \$24,647,000 deficit showed up in May, the government's financial statement for that month disclosed Friday.

As in previous months, the government made up this deficit with a temporary loan. This brought total temporary loans paid to the pension fund since April 1, 1952, to \$119,188,444.

The scheme is financed by receipts from a slice of two per cent from the government's sales tax, individual income tax and corporation tax. Revenues from these three sources increased to \$25,222,000 during May from \$11,738,000 last year. Pension payments during the month rose to \$27,869,000 from \$26,210,000.
