Earle MacDonald Gets Nod Over Roy; Ramsay Winner

Earle MacDonald, Western Canadian welterweight champ, gained a unanimous decision over Gaston Roy, St. Dunstan's University midweight, at Raceway Stadium in Summerside — Saturday night in a bruising ten-round battle that a number of ringsiders classed as "the best fight of the 1955 season."

The boys seemed very evenly matched through nine rounds with dress cards giving MacDonald a slight margin in four of five rounds, one going to Roy, and the rest even.

MacDonald really took charge in the final round, stinging Roy repeatedly with left hooks, but Gas-

ton was still full of fight at the final bell.

MacDonald's clever defence took some of the brunt of Roy's charging attacks. Gaston did tag the British Columbia boy with some effective punches during the fray, however. Roy seemed particularly vulnerable to MacDonald's flashing left, but the rugged French-Canadian was never in serious trouble.

Summerside's Bud Ramsay scored a TKO over Holly Borden of Halifax in the fourth round of a scheduled six-round semi-final. Borden kept grabbing his opponent to escape punishment, and this changed the slug-fest into a tag waltz at times, through the

Frank Roberts had the Beavers in complete control in the second contest and they could do no better than get one lonely hit and one walk off his slants. In addition Roberts sent 10 batters down swinging.

Gerard McCarthy after winning the first contest went down to defeat in the second, allowing 7 hits while walking 3, and was the victim of some shoddy support on the part of his mates.

Arrows rightfielder Bobby Mills made a sensational shoe-string catch off Pius MacInnis' drive in the second frame for the fielding gem of the game.

Jack Shepherd handled the two game behemoth the plate while Pineau, Duffy and MacInnis were on the bases.

Major League Season Ends With Sensational Pitching

The major leagues wound up operations for 1955 Sunday and the way some pitchers worked you'd think the pennant depended on the results.

Redlegs held the Chicago Cubs to a paltry four hits while his mates were slapping around three Windy City hurlers for 17 hits and a 13-0 triumph.

It ended on a somewhat inglorious note for the Phils got the final three outs in the ninth inning on a triple play after the Giants had put two runners on with none out. Durocher announced his resignation Saturday. Willie Mays hit his first home run in the opener to tie the club record.

Of the 10 games, there were three shutouts, two one-run performances and three two-run jobs.

One of the shutouts was a team accomplishment with four pitchers dividing the honors. That came in Brooklyn's 4-0 conquest of the last-place Pittsburgh Pirates after Pirates manager Fred Haney had been fired.

Brook pilot Walt Alston wanted to give as many of his hurlers as possible a workout in preparation for the world series starting Wednesday. Johnny Podres, Russ Meyer, Clem Labine and Roger Craig all had a hand in the whitewashing.

White Sox limited the Kansas City to three hits while his club was registering a 5-0 triumph.

George Susce of the Boston Red Sox whipped the New York Yankees 8-1 in the second game of a doubleheader after the American League champions had taken the first 8-2 behind the assorted offerings of Bob Turley, Bob Grim and Johnny Kucks.

Curt Simmons and Jack Meyer combined to whip New York 3-1 in the nightcap after the Giants had licked Philadelphia 5-2 in the first game of a doubleheader behind Pete Burnside. The second game marked the finish of Leo Durocher's reign as manager of the Giants.

Bob Miller, a promising youngster, tossed a seven-hitter as the Detroit Tigers turned back the Cleveland Indians 6-2. In other action, the St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Milwaukee Braves 8-4 and the Baltimore Orioles triumphed over the Washington Senators 5-4.

The Senators clinched the American League basement spot Saturday as they lost a doubleheader 8-5 and 1-0 to their closest rivals, the Orioles.

Only 765 spectators turned up at Washington's Griffith Stadium to see the end of a hard battle for last place between the two teams during the final weeks of the season.

Cleveland, meanwhile, wrapped up second place beating Detroit twice, 8-3 and 7-0, behind Herb Score and Hank Aguirre. In the opener, Detroit's Al Kaline became the first major leaguer to get 200 hits.
