Two Wonderful Warships.

According to a late London special, the enormous unarmored cruiser Terrible, recently built on the Clyde, for the British navy, maintained a speed of twenty knots an hour on her recent maiden trip from Glasgow to Portsmouth, and it is asserted that her maximum speed was 24 knots, which is certainly remarkable in view of her size and length, 14,200 and 500 feet, respectively. Not less remarkable is the Terrible's coal-carrying capacity, enabling her to steam 25,000 miles without refueling.

THE ONTARIO LOCAL GOVERNMENT.

Toronto, July 14.—This afternoon Hon. A. S. Hardy was sworn in as prime minister of Ontario in succession to Sir Oliver Mowat. W. D. Balfour, speaker in the legislature, steps into the vacancy in the cabinet, which is now constituted as follows:

Premier and Attorney-General—A. S. Hardy. Commissioner of Crown Lands—Hon. J. M. Gibson. Provincial Secretary—Hon. W. D. Balfour. Provincial Treasurer—Hon. Richard Harcourt. Minister of Agriculture—Hon. John Dryden. Minister of Education—Hon. G. W. Ross. Minister of Public Works—Hon. Wm. Hardy. Minister without portfolio—Hon. Mr. Bronson.

LOCAL OPTION IN AUSTRALIA.

In connection with the New South Wales system of local self government practical effect has been given, but not very successfully, to the principle of local option. For many years there was a strong agitation in favor of local option, or the right of the inhabitants of the district to control the liquor traffic in that district, and on several occasions unsuccessful attempts were made to legislate upon the subject. In the year 1882, however, an enactment of the principle was included in the Licensing Act then passed, which, with an amendment made in the following year, is still in force.

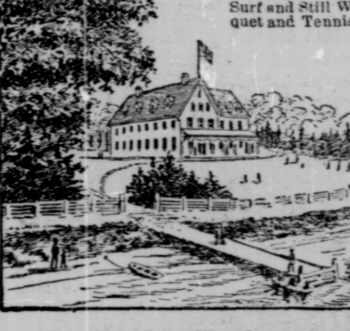

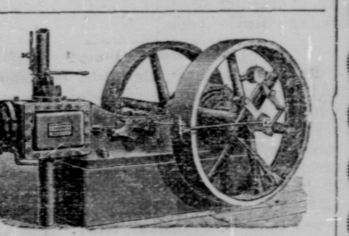
