#### Men's Fall Fashions

Men's knit shirts and sweaters have become so interesting, so unusual, so wearable, she'll want to see the man in her life rigged out in proper style.

Some of the most attractive numbers include sweaters, hand-made by women of an Indian tribe in the Canadian Rockies. Each sweater takes about four weeks to make and the designs are something to get excited about. These, of course, are not to be had at bargain prices! But if you can afford one, you'll find it is handsome, colorful practical and washable.

Then there are the Scandinavian-designed sweaters done for the first time in one of the wonder fabrics and other handsome models, by the same designer, in wool. The colors are "locked in," so to speak, and can't fade with wear or washing.

How maddening it is to buy something because of its color and then see the hues quickly fade!

**ITALIAN INFLUENCE**  
The Italian influence is strong in fashions for women and it has made its mark, too, in fashions for men. This is evident in rugged masculine collars, jumbo stitching and interesting stripes.

As for knitted shirts, all the experts in men's fashions predict the biggest season yet for these. There is even a ribbon-knit in white cloth that has new-looking side-vent short sleeves.

Pullovers are taking to distinctive patterns, too. For instance, one model features a deep V inset in colorful pattern on a plain pullover. The V band dips in front below the waistline. A snow white pullover has what looks like a dickey, but is actually a navy blue knitted inset.

**GENTLE HANDLING**  
Keep in mind that wool needs gentle handling in lukewarm water and plenty of suds. Wool fibers soak up so much that a wool garment needs more suds than usual to get it really clean. The miracle fabrics keep their shape and softness through any number of washings.

For a blend of fibers, wash the garment as if it were made entirely of the majority fiber.

Take that little bit of trouble to block wools that require such treatment to keep their original shape. You can make the same type of cardboard drying frames for your husband's knitwear as you're accustomed to using for your own wool garments.

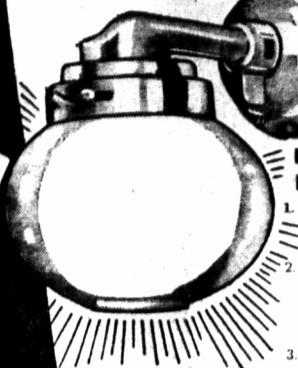

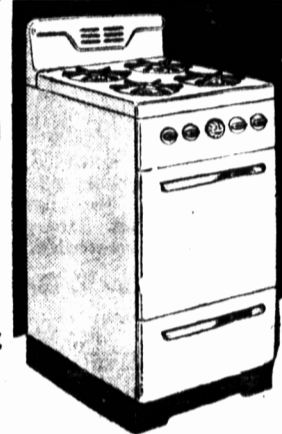
