

Spencer Retains Maritime Welter Title

Battles To A Draw With Poulton In Sizzling Ten Round Bout Here

Hard punching Tommy "Gun" Spencer of New Waterford, N.S. retained his Maritime Welter-weight Title at the Forum last night when he battled to a sizzling ten round draw with Harry Poulton of Charlottetown in one of the best fights staged here for a long time. Spencer weighed 146, Poulton 145.

Poulton came back off the car-vas twice to battle with the Tommy Gun in the vicious fight as he sought to regain the title he lost to Spencer two weeks ago. The bruising battle kept the large crowd jumping out of their seats.

Spencer put Poulton on his back for eight counts in the fifth and eighth rounds with a wicked left hook. In both cases there was only several seconds remaining in the round and Poulton was saved from any further difficulty.

Judge Danny MacCormack voted five rounds for Spencer, three for Poulton, and two even Opl. Bill Warner gave Poulton five rounds, Spencer four and called off a draw. Judge Jack Cameron called it a draw.

Other Bouts

The fight was the highlight of an action packed card. Rangy Austin Squarebriggs won a sixth round decision from Louis Lafferty in the semi-final. Johnny Russell won a T.K.O. over Soggy Reid in the fifth round. Bud Ramsay, Summerside, T.K.O. over Soggy Reid in the third and Lloyd Carr in the first.

The muscular, powerfully built Spencer started off by carrying the fight to Poulton. Harry kept the New Waterford boy off balance with his rapier-like left and got the better of the three sharp exchanges in the first round.

The boys turned on the heat in the second. Both were moving and punching at a fast clip with Spencer coming on strong at the end of the round.

Poulton did a masterful job of keeping Spencer off balance with his left in the third. Harry was sending his punches home with more steam behind them.

Round four produced some beautiful in-fighting. Spencer was hammering away at Poulton's body but was taking facial punishment. Poulton's left right combination punches were showing their results.

Both boys fought on even terms throughout most of the fifth. They were sparring along the ropes when suddenly Spencer's left shot out of the blue and dropped Poulton on his back. Harry survived the round without much trouble.

Poulton and Spencer threw the book at one another in the sixth as they slugged it out in mid-ring while the crowd roared with excitement. The round produced the most vicious fighting of the right.

Harry went on the offensive in the seventh to produce another brilliant round. They boxed along on even terms in the eighth until Spencer unleashed another of his left hooks to send Poulton through the ropes. Poulton took an eight count and got up at the bell.

Rounds nine and ten produced more hard punching fast moving action. Spencer, the stronger of the two, kept boring in, while Poulton, the boxer, threw lefts and rights to the New Waterford boy's head.

Poulton And Spencer To Be Rematched

Harry Poulton and Tommy "Gun" Spencer, Maritime welter-weight king have been rematched to fight at the Forum, announced promoter Bill Brown less than an hour after last night's bristling ten rounder.

The date of the fight has not been decided but Mr. Brown stated that Spencer had agreed to give Poulton another crack at his title on his next fight.

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Favorites Advance To Quarter-Final Stage In Maritime Golf Tourney

Favorites advanced all along the line in accordance with pre-tournament predictions, as play moved into the quarter finals of the Maritime Amateur Golf Championship over the Belvedere links of the Charlottetown Golf Club yesterday.

The nearest approach to an upset was the 6 and 5 victory of Wm. "Bud" Beer of Charlottetown over J. "Nip" Ross of Sydney in an afternoon round. Ross earlier disposed of medalist Frank MacInnis of Charlottetown 3 and 2.

While there were few surprises yesterday, it resulted in an interesting set-up for today. Youthful Thane Cody of Riverside Club, Saint John, is drawn against the Nova Scotian champion Lorne Smith of the Brightwood Club, Dartmouth. The defending champion, Maurice "Mousie" Dowling of Moncton Lakewood Club, will meet Rohan Duchemin, Sydney Lingan Club, Two Charlottetownians, Wm. "Bud" Beer and Art MacKenzie, long rivals of the golf lanes for the Prince Edward Island Championship, meet in another bracket, while in yet another a former two-time Maritime champion, Pete Kelly from Fredericton, N. B., and R. J. Foley of Dartmouth Brightwood will match strokes.

Dowling began the defence of his crown in impressive style. In a morning round he won from Bob Rae of New Glasgow, N. S., 5 and 4, and in the afternoon went on to defeat clubmate R. Morrison 3 and 1.

Lorne Smith showed almost uncanny accuracy on the greens as he won his morning round from J. Andrew Lively, Charlottetown, 4 and 2. In his second match of the day Smith downed clubmate Wm. Wood in a like manner, the match ending on the 16th green.

Pete Kelly took A. McCuaig of the Ashburn Club, Halifax, 6 and 5 in his opening match of the day and later accounted for R. Jollymore, Dartmouth, 2 and 1.

The second and third divisions narrowed to the semi-final rounds during the day's play. Battling it out in the second division today will be D. Patterson of the Westfield Club, Saint John, Skip Sear of the home club, R. Noble, Moncton, and T. Bainbridge of the Ashburn Club, Halifax.

In the third division semi-finals are M. Wilson, Moncton, Dr. Chris Gallant, Charlottetown, P. A. Roberts, Brightwood, Dartmouth, and V. H. Savage, Ashburn, Halifax.

The professionals move into action today playing the first 36 holes in their 72 hole play for the Maritime title. Among those on hand for the competition are Cecil Dowling, Green Gables Golf Club; Sam Kerr, Ken-Wo; Jim Walker, Amherst; Alan Ogilvie, Moncton; Vin Halsall, Moncton; Pete Shymko, Truro, and Marc Sandow, of the host club.

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IN THIS CORNER

Sports followers who took in the opening day's competitions in either the Maritime Golf Championships or the Provincial Rifle Association Prize Meet held here on Monday, should have enjoyed more than their share of thrills. Leading golfers and marksmen came up with some stirring displays in both departments.

Out at the Charlottetown Golf Club's Belvedere course, the cream of junior and amateur shotmakers from the three seaside Provinces went through championship and qualifying play that produced a wealth of low scores and close stroking. Leading a field of sixty-four golfers home in the qualifying round in amateur competition, Frank "Had" McInnis and Dor. "Duck" MacDonald of the City Club and Maurice "Mousie" Dowling, of Moncton, came through 18 holes of play with one over par 74's to tie for the leadership and force a three-hole playoff to decide winner and runner-up prizes.

Strangely enough, however, three holes wasn't enough. McInnis and Dowling still remained deadlocked after the three extra holes with MacDonald falling short by two strokes, the two continuing on into a fourth hole before the issue was decided in favor of McInnis. The fact that the three had to go into extra play was not so uncommon, for Dowling, a master shotmaker in Maritime circles, has had to go through four playoffs for such honors in past seasons. It was the calibre of play that took the eye of the large gallery of fans who followed the extra holes competition.

Sinking a beautiful 20-foot putt for a par four on the first hole, McInnis went one stroke up on the first hole, while Dowling, the one over par, took the one over on the second. McInnis and Dowling scored with par three's on the second, MacDonald faltering on the green to fall behind two strokes with a five. Dowling and MacDonald retrenched on the third by coming up with par performances on the 355 yard, par four hole, known as the "Hollow". Dowling's par four over McInnis' five (the result of a hook shot going down the fairway) put him into the tie position again, but MacDonald's par performance wasn't enough to pull him up into the running again. Going into the fourth hole, three skillful approach shots by McInnis that put him within two feet of the flag was the deciding factor in his win, putting out in a par four. Dowling's approaches weren't quite so accurate, taking him just inside the green on three strokes. He made a valiant attempt to tie it again with a hard, long putt the ball rolling just past the rim of the cup to stop a foot away.

It was left to young Lee Windsor, Jr., of Halifax, to come through with the sparkling performance of the day, however. Placing 16th in the qualifying round of the championship division with an 81 in the morning, the sharpshooting junior came in the final 18-holes of play in through with a one over par 73 the afternoon to record the best gross score for 18 holes during the day and headed a field of nine others to capture the Maritime Junior crown with a gross 154 for the 366-hole competition.

In the outgoing nine in the afternoon, the youngster from the Ashburn Club of Halifax, carded a glittering one under par 34 and came home with a 39 for two strokes over par to cap his near perfect 73 performance. Lee, incidentally, is the son of Vince Windsor a well-known business man and former resident of this city, who also is no mean golfer. While visiting here last summer, Mr. Windsor scored an eagle over one of the tough holes at the Green Gables course at Cavendish.

At the same time that golfers were making their mark at Belvedere, Provincial rifle experts were setting a pace that has been seldom seen here in the annual competition. In four matches fired in the opening days' shoot of the Provincial Rifle Association's 79th Annual Prize Meet, eight possibilities were registered and 22 other scores of 49 out of a possible 50 were recorded.

In the opening DeBlois Brothers Match, three perfect scores were made to force a shoot-off for top honors while 10 other marksmen scored one under a possible, while in the Moore and McLeod Match four possible 50's were recorded and three had 49's

Capt. E. R. Burke Wins City Of Ch'town Match At Rifle Ass'n Meet

Competition in the second day's matches of the 79th Annual Provincial Rifle Association Prize Meet, held yesterday at the Squaw Point Range, produced more top notch scores, although riflemen fell short of the large number of possible scores recorded on opening day.

Captain E. R. Burke of the P. E. I. Regt. was the winner of yesterday's opening competition, the City of Charlottetown Match, posting a 97 out of a possible 100. It was a two range match, 10 rounds from each of the 300 and 600 yard ranges. Major A. F. Gormley, Captain A. J. McCabe, Sgt. Eric Coles, Lt. G. J. Rogers and Captain R. A. McCabe all tied for the runner-up position with scores of 96.

In the British Consols Match, the second and concluding match for the day, Bdr. Ray MacDonald of the 28th L.A.A. Regt., rang up a 73 out of a possible 75 for top honors. He was followed closely by Gnr. W. Crockett, O/C T. F. Baines, WO1. A. D. MacMasters and Major A. F. Gormley, who all posted 72's, one below the winning score.

Major Gormley Leads

Major A. F. Gormley, former Bisley representative, led on aggregate scoring at the end of two days of competition, posting the excellent total of 363 out of a possible 375, just 12 points down on a perfect score in competitions to date. Gnr. C. C. Strong, 47th Anti-Tank Regt., Windsor, N. S., holds the next best aggregate with 359.

In the first day's aggregate, the positions of the two men were reversed. Gnr. Strong led the first day with a 197 and Major Gormley a 195, who ended in a tie with Lt. R. E. Jenkins. Other leading aggregates in the first day were P. J. Landrigan, A. M. Johnston, E. R. Burke, H. T. Vessey and Alvin MacDonald, all registering 192's.

Two medals, donated by the P. E. I. Regt. (17th Recce) to the members of the regiment or of the Association for the first day's aggregate were won by Major A. F. Gormley (195) and Captain E. R. Burke (192).

The west-end crew scored three runs in the big third inning on a walk, two errors and a single by Anchors fiery catcher Willis Hennessey.

They added another in the fourth when Glen Matheson was issued a free ticket to first and got around to third on two errors. Merlin MacKenzie drove him home with a single to right.

Ryan struck out eleven men during the seven innings he worked. At no time was he in trouble and only one Rover reached third base. Charlie struck out three men in the first inning and five in a row in the fifth and sixth innings.

Benny Carson allowed only one hit in four frames. Not a ball was hit past Benny in the first two innings. Donnie MacLean struck out four men in three innings and allowed two hits. MacLean replaced Carson in the fifth.

Smartest play of the night was pulled off by MacLean and Carson. Ryan hit an infield roller down towards first. MacLean, on the mound for the Rovers, raced over to cover first, took Carson's throw and caught Ryan by inches.
