OTTAWA (CP)—RCMP Commissioner George B. McClellan said—on a path here that Prime Minister Pearson asked him in late November, 1964, whether he had any information indicating any impropriety or anything of a scandalous nature involving any MP in any party over the last 10 years. "I was of course aware that the matters we are discussing today, in part at least, were the subject of gossip and in answer to the direct question of the prime minister I said, 'yes, Munsinger inquiry was within a week of influence-peddling allegations against top Liberals by Conservative MP Erik Nielsen in the House of Commons. ## Ford Income Sets Record

DETROIT (AP)—Ford Motor Co. has reported its 1966 first-quarter sales and net income were the highest in any opening three months in Ford history. Consolidated net income of \$210,200,000 compared with the old record of \$206,800,000 set in the first quarter last year. Consolidated net income a share was \$1.89, ahead of the \$1.81 for corresponding period last year. The first quarter report showed consolidated sales of \$3,181,700,000, about nine per-

cent ahead of the \$2,912,200,000 in the opening quarter last year. First quarter worldwide sales of cars, trucks and tractors totalled 1,238,191 units. This was four-per-cent ahead of the 824 sold in the first quarter of 1965.

## Fish And Game Annual Slated Monday Night

Just about the most important meeting of the year of the Provincial Fish and Game Executive has been called for Monday night at Confederation Centre. This is the annual crystal ball session where the representative body of nimrods on the Island get together to make recommendations for next fall's hunting seasons and bag limits. From Timnish to Souris, representatives and directors from the five Island branches will congregate to make known the wishes of the membership and attempt to hammer out a consensus to pass on to the Provincial Fish and Wildlife Service. I emphasize the fact that these are recommendations only. The provincial department has the last word on regulations regarding upland species and fur bearers, and the Federal Wildlife Service sets up the Migratory bird regulations after considering recommendations from all provinces and taking into consideration their own research. However, the suggestions of the provincial group do play a part in making final decisions.

With the nutty licensing system in effect in the province it's almost impossible for the Provincial Service to accurately gauge populations, and when it comes right down to it there is mainly a "guess and by God" approach to the thorny problem of harvesting only the surplus of the renewable resource. Charles Bartlett, the Provincial Fish and Wildlife Director, will be a guest at the meeting to answer queries from the executive regarding the amendments that were adopted at the recent session of the legislature. The members will want to know for sure just what sort of program the service can carry on in view of the new amendments. I suspect that many of Mr. Bartlett's plans have had a severe crimp put in them, and it will be interesting to find out just what will happen to things like proposed pheasant preserves, fishing preserves and the like.

**OPEN SEASON**  
Both Queen's and Prince County branches favor some sort of open season this fall, though they differ on the length of time to be made available to the hunter. This is one of the points to be ironed out at Monday's meeting. The general feeling is that a limited hunting pressure won't hurt the population very much, and a season of some sort will allow an assessment of the true state of the birds. It's a fact that the only way you can find out these things is to have people in the field and accurately report-

### Paper Company Earnings Up

MONTREAL (CP)—Net earnings of Consolidated Paper Corp. Ltd. totalled \$3,333,665 or 56 cents a share for the first quarter of 1966, Fred W. Bradshaw, president, said here. This compares with net earnings of \$3,022,240 or 52 cents a share for the corresponding period last year. Mr. Bradshaw told the annual meeting that permission recently granted by the provincial government allowing Consolidated's mills to operate seven days a week "has assisted greatly in meeting the current surge in demand, as this has had the effect of increasing our capacity by about 11 per cent."

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal's second "How to Invest" show, this Monday, has attracted not only inquisitive newcomers to the world of stocks and bonds, but veteran investors anxious to keep abreast of all the latest developments. The exhibitors taking part include stockbrokers, trust companies, mutual funds, major business houses, investment advisers and investment clubs. Said Robert McBeth, promotion manager for the organizers, Industrial and Trade Shows of Canada: "Our whole aim is to provide investment education for the small investor. It is particularly for people who are inclined to seek out investment advice on their own. Here they find under one roof information about many forms of investment." The Bell Telephone stand features teletype machines which hammer out answers to potential investors' questions on the company, and film shows on its work. **DISPLAY WORK** Dornier is displaying samples of its work and dispensing carrier bags containing literature on the company, and the Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges stand has a scale model of their new skyscraper building. One of the organizations represented is the Canadian Association of Investment Clubs which has nearly 300 member clubs. "One of the aims of an investment club," said an association representative, "is to give the small investor a chance to learn something about the financial world.
