As the hall is only six miles from Charlottetown and a nice large city one, it is supposed that quite a number from town will take a drive out to hear the Prof.

The Post Office department having received several complaints that postage stamps will not adhere to letters owing to insufficient mucilage, suggests that the evil complained of is due to the fact that too much is taken off in the process of wetting them. The remedy proposed is to moisten them before the stamps are affixed. This, it is believed will make the stamps stick.

The Canadian Express Co., for which W. W. CLE, Esq., is agent here have instituted a money order system their orders being payable at over 15,000 places in Canada and the U. S. The system does not require filling out bank applications, there is no tedious formalities, and the orders can be cashed anywhere. This will be of great advantage to travellers.

MR. J. H. BELL, representative of the Grand Orange Lodge of P. E. I., at the triennial council recently held at Toronto, arrived home Tuesday night. Some of the brethren of Bays Lodge met Mr. Bell at the railway station with a barouche and conveyed him to the Orange hall. Mr. Bell also attended the sessions of the M. W. Grand Lodge at Kingston, Ont., as the representative of P. E. I.

We regret very much to hear of the death of Mr. Wm. Hamlyn, of Totnes, Devonshire, Eng., father of Rev. Mr. Hamlyn, of St. Paul's, Charlottetown. He passed away on Sunday, July 19th, aged 63. Mr. Hamlyn was the High Bailiff of the County Court. He was a devoted member of the Established Church, and Superintendent in the Totnes Sunday School. Four of his sons are in the ministry. The rector of St. Paul's will have the sympathy of the community in his great loss.

CANADA'S International Exhibition, St. John, N. B., Sept 23 to Oct 3rd. Arrangements have been completed with nearly all the Railway and Steamship Companies for very low rates and special excursions during the time of the Exhibition. The Musical Society of St. John are making their arrangements for repeating the mammoth concert which was given last year, on a much larger scale, and to be held in a separate building in order to avoid the crowding and noise which was a drawback of last year. Some of the leading soloists of the United States have been engaged for this concert. The Exhibition Association have just completed arrangements for a series of balloon ascensions and parachute drops in addition to the numerous other attractions which have been engaged.

Ye Editor Abroad. J. H. BELL, Esq., M. A., M. P. P., editor of the Press an interesting letter to his paper on the trip across. While at St. John's Nfld. he dropped in on our old friend P. R. Bowers Esq., of the Colonist, which paper by the way has lately been enlarged and improved. Mr. Bell says: The next place of interest for the Colonist is the editor of Newfoundland. Mr. Bowers is a man of fine physique, broad and intelligent and impressive face. His opinion on public matters has great weight with the people of Newfoundland. From what we could learn it was his paper, more than any other influence, which carried the elections and determined the peace against Confederation. As a rule the Newfoundlanders are no union with Canada. They once were, but were opposed, as they are now, to the union with Canada. They are now at work here leaving the people. They are getting into debt. The Government refuses to retrench and economize. New railway projects are in the wind, new and costly public works are being undertaken, and soon the ancient colony that has so far withstood the seductive influences of Sir Charles Tupper and Sir John McDonald will yield to the more potent monetary considerations, and will seek admission to the union as the only available escape from a debt too burdensome to be borne alone. Our friend Bowers is not now adverse to Confederation.

Island with his family in July, 1858.
