

FOLLY OF GOOD SWIMMERS.

Chances in the Water They Wouldn't Land.

"You generally see tacked to the end of the newspaper dispatch announcing the drowning of some man at the bathing beach, 'He was an expert swimmer,'" said Captain Mullen, the life guard at Colonial Beach—a ruddy, strapping, former man-o'-war's man—who has snaked nearly 200 drowning men and women out of the water at various seashore resorts. "And the statement is true in a great many cases. I know that fully eight out of ten of the men I have grabbed just in time have been first class swimmers. The good swimmer of course takes more chances than the man who is only a fair swimmer or the man who can't swim at all. He is inclined to show off. It is a queer thing to say, but all the same it is true, that bunches of young women on the beaches are responsible for many of the surf drownings.

"The good swimmers among the young fellows in bathing want to display their skill advantageously for the benefit of the girls, and they take chances that I wouldn't take, and I was naturally born in the water.

"They pay no attention whatever to the conditions or to anything else, and, suggesting in all sorts of fancy work for the benefit of the outlooking girls, they get away out beyond the breaker line. If the tide is against them on the return trip and they have to work hard to make the beach, a sudden fear takes possession of them and chills their blood and rattles their brains, and then, if somebody is not by to handle them, it is all over with them. At the beaches where the surf is very heavy and the undertow extremely treacherous, particularly along the line of resorts on the New England coast, I have often warned venturesome young fellows to

have a care and not under any circumstances to go beyond the breaker line. They have grinned in my face—a couple of girls being around, of course—and they have then jumped in and done just the thing I warned them not to do. Of course I have always had to go in after them when they let their cheeks of distress out, and often I have had a hard enough time getting them. It makes me sore to have to go after a man whom I have taken the pains to warn.

"Another thing that good swimmers fail to take into account is the liability of something happening to them in the water that is just as liable to happen to them when they are dressed, ashore, and violently exerting themselves.

"A man who leads a sedentary life goes down to a bathing beach after enduring a long season of heat, and he jumps in and romps around the water with just as much confidence as he possessed when he was a small boy with limber muscles. If he gets a twitch, he probably pays no attention to it, and by the time he begins to realize that his heart is in trouble he is pretty nearly if not quite a goner.

"More expert swimmers drown owing to heart failure than anybody has any idea of. Then again, men, often drink a lot of stuff just before going into the surf, and these stand a worse than even money chance of getting cramps. I don't care how fine a swimmer a man is, he can't do business in the water when he becomes cramped. I used to be funny and a smart Alec in the water before I went into the life guard business, and I am just as fond of showing off as any of the rest of the boys, but if you watch me right hard for a solid month, even down here at such a comparatively calm and safe beach as this, you'll perceive that I don't take any chances by trying to swim, with my ears for propelling power, down to Fort Monroe or to put on any other kind of frills of that sort."—Washington Post.
