Cardinal Spellman Stands On Vietnam War Statement

SAIGON (AP)—Francis Cardinal Spellman said today he stands on his statement that anything less than an allied victory in Vietnam is inconceivable.

The statement and others have provoked broadsides against him from Soviet commentators and from North Vietnam. The Communists have accused him of contradicting the words of Pope Paul, who appealed in a Christmas message for a "miracle of peace."

Cardinal Spellman's statements in a Christmas Eve sermon in Saigon were reported to have upset Vatican circles. Unofficial Vatican sources said the declarations seemed to be out of keeping with the efforts of Pope Paul to encourage a negotiated end to the war in Vietnam.

The Cardinal was told after his return to Saigon today of Communist accusations against his remarks, and he replied: "Whatever I said, I stand by it."

Cardinal Spellman, in his sermon, called the Vietnam conflict a "war for civilization."

He continued: "We do hope and pray... we shall soon have the victory for which all of us in Vietnam and all over the world are praying and hoping, for less than victory is inconceivable."

SPOKE TO REPORTER

The 77-year-old cardinal, Roman Catholic military vicar of the U.S. armed forces and archbishop of New York, spoke briefly with a reporter after he had celebrated mass in Saigon.

Addressing the congregation, which included many U.S. officers and enlisted men, Spellman said:

"It is a difficult task to bring peace when there is so much malice, so much hatred in the world."

"We hope and pray that God in some way will give us a miracle—the miracle of a just and enduring peace."

There is a great deal to be said in favor of the simple game. I am reminded of this by the accompanying hand played in the match between Sweden and the United States in 1953.

My partner, Johan Crawford, opened the bidding with a spade and West passed. Now it is true that the North hand is slightly short of the values for a three spade bid (forcing) and such a bid is subject to criticism for that reason, but the fact is that North is only about a jack away from his proper values and there is no better alternative bid available.
