Atlantic Development Bd. Being Considered By Gov't.

OTTAWA (CP) - The government is studying possible establishment of a federal-Atlantic development board to examine projects recommended by the Atlantic provinces or other parties, Prime Minister Diefenbaker said Tuesday.

He told the Commons the board which is being considered would give assistance and recommend appropriate plans to the government.

The prime minister was replying to Robert C. Coates (PC-Cumberland) who asked about a possible Atlantic development "fund."

Mr. Diefenbaker did not refer to a fund in his reply. Mr. Coates began his question by referring to a recent article in the monthly Atlantic Advocate.

The Atlantic Advocate said in its April issue the federal government should set up an Atlantic development council to carry out a development policy in the Maritimes region.

The editorial said such a policy would be empowered to examine projects recommended by provincial governments or other parties, and to give assistance and recommend appropriate plans to the government.

In Fredericton, Michael Wardell, honorary secretary of the Chignecto Canal Committee, said: "This news is a complete vindication of all the hopes and the efforts and the planning of the people of this region over the past years. There will be general rejoicing."

Following is text of the Commons exchange between Mr. Coates and Mr. Diefenbaker. Mr. Coates: I have a question for the prime minister. In view of the recent article in The Atlantic Advocate referring to the possibility of a development fund for the Maritime provinces and in view of the recommendation, among other things, of feasibility studies of public projects in the Atlantic provinces, does the prime minister have any comment to make?

Mr. Diefenbaker: The honorable gentleman gave me notice of his question. The government is now studying this matter and is giving consideration to the establishment of a federal-Atlantic development board or a fund which would be empowered to examine projects recommended by provincial governments or other parties, and to give assistance and recommend appropriate plans to the government.

Amalgamation Study Planned In Halifax Area

HALIFAX (CP)—Mayor Lloyd said he will recommend to city council the establishment of a commission to study amalgamation of surrounding areas with the city of Halifax.

He would recommend that the study be done by the province "so we'll be sure of getting an independent observation."

President R. W. Burge of the Ratepayers Association of Suburban Fairview said Tuesday night following a meeting of suburban Rockingham ratepayers and members of the city council that the ratepayers wanted more information on the proposed amalgamation.

Mr. Burge said Tuesday details would be made known as soon as they are available. More than a year ago neighboring Dartmouth amalgamated with its suburbs and subsequently became Nova Scotia's third city Jan. 1, 1961.
