### Queen's County Magistrate's Ct.

Before Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet yesterday an accused charged with driving while impaired received a fine of \$65 and costs. Four speeders appearing were each fined \$10 and costs or ten days imprisonment. Fines of \$5 and costs were handed down to two persons, one for operating a motor vehicle with a beginner's license while there was no qualified driver in the vehicle, and the other for failure to transfer the registration papers after buying a motor vehicle. For operating a motor vehicle having a load whose width was more than 96 inches the accused received a fine of \$1. Three other traffic charges, one for operating a car while the accused's permit was cancelled, another for driving on the wrong side of the road, and a third, for failure to stop at the scene of an accident, were adjourned for one week.

The following is a copy of a resolution passed by the City Council on Friday, August 3rd:—

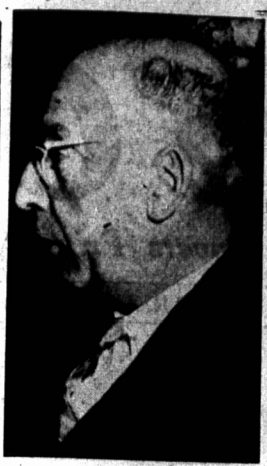

Mr. James A. Fullerton, City Clerk of Charlottetown, who has been appointed Provincial Chairman of the Municipal Finance Officers Association for the Province of Prince Edward Island for a term expiring June 30, 1959.

The appointment is recognized as being important in this international association composed of nearly 2,700 public finance and other officials representing governmental units in the United States, Canada, Alaska, Guam, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, Virgin Islands, Mexico, Panama, and the Philippines.

The appointment was made by Charles L. Mathews, President of the M.F.O.A. of the United States and Canada, and deputy municipal revenue collector, Atlanta, Georgia.

As a matter of fact there is something in the window to attract the attention of practically everyone regardless of his or her interests. Primarily the display is taken up with tartan, skirts, shirts and scarves but in the foreground are the cups, trophies and medals which will be awarded this afternoon at the Caledonia Clubs games on the exhibition grounds.

Credit for the arrangement goes to Jed Maddigan, the Guardian was told by Wilfred McLeod and Lou Doyle. The display of tartan is being used to tie in with "Tartan Week".

In one of the main windows are the various tartan skirts, tartan yard goods, Balmoral tams and garragery wedges. Arranged in front of the skirts are the trophies and cups.

The prize section in itself presents an interesting spectacle. There is the Sutherland Scottish Trophy along with five other major trophies which will be awarded to champion dancers and pipers. The whole athletic section is ringed with medals.

The left hand show window at the entrance of the store displays tartan ties, skirts, scarves, swim trunks, shirts and utility bags for men and women.

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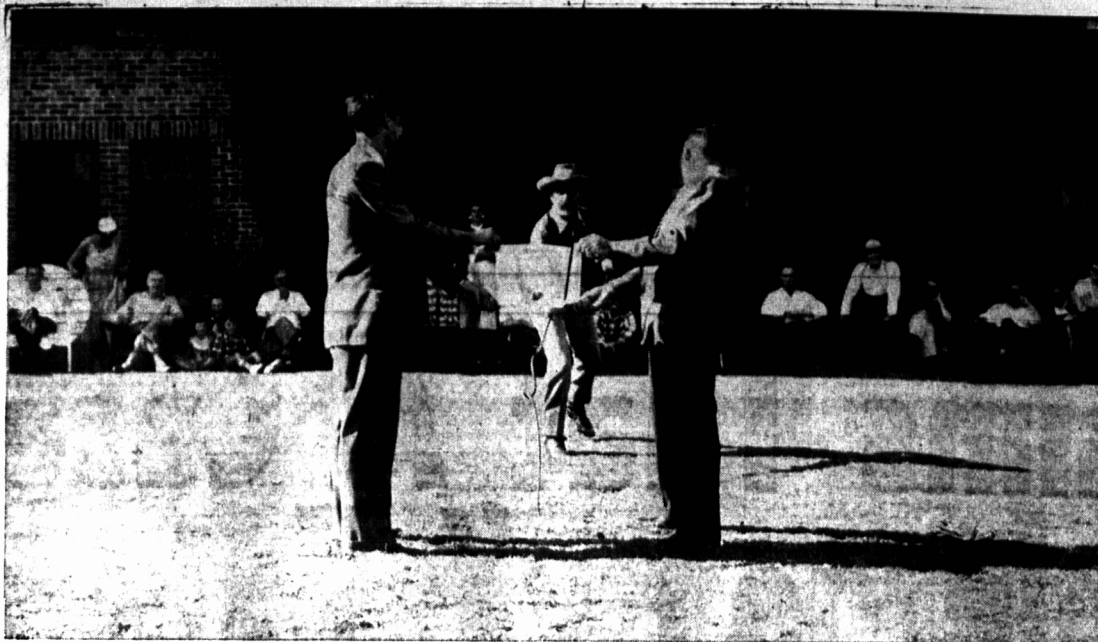

### CCF Convention Scraps Harsh Regina Manifesto

WINNIPEG (CP) — The CCF, in a wave of moderation, has set out to replace its founding Regina Manifesto of 1933 with a milder declaration of principles.

Expected to be adopted with little change today by the national convention of the party is a 24-paragraph draft declaration calling for a mixed economy of free enterprise and public ownership and supporting opportunity and security for private business.

If the 200 delegates approve the draft the CCF will have a statement of principles which party leaders said will supersede all other previous statements, including the manifesto, and reflect the thinking of social democrats in an era of prosperity.

Ten paragraphs of the new draft were approved Wednesday with only minor changes in wording.

DISMISS HARSH WORDS  
The harsh depression words of the Regina document that "no CCF government will rest content until it has eradicated capitalism" have been summarily dropped in the new declaration. Draft committee chairman David Lewis admitted to the convention they had become "politically troublesome."

Instead, the Winnipeg statement sets a broader aim which makes no mention of capitalism. It says the CCF will work for "equality and freedom, a sense of human dignity, . . . a free and peaceful world."

Politically, it signals a right turn for the party, but it retains certain socialistic sides including:

1. That a moral and just society directed to human needs and enrichment of human life cannot be achieved under a predominantly capitalist system.

2. That private profit and corporate planning must be subordinate to social planning.

3. That public ownership is the best means of breaking "the stranglehold by private monopolies on the life of the nation."

4. That a society of mutual respect and equality of opportunity can be built only by social planning.
