Bishop LaFleche's Pastoral.

THREE RIVERS, Que., Oct. 10.

Bishop LaFleche, of this diocese, has issued a pastoral, imposing a tithe on the hay crop. Grain is now so little cultivated that the clergy, it is said, can hardly live on their tithes from it. The Bishop says that, having to protect his priests as well as the faithful, he orders that from the present all farmers and others raising hay within the limits of the diocese be required to pay to the cure \$7.50 on every thousand bundles of hay. This contribution will have to be paid in money. His Lordship says that he who neglects to pay his tithes will be guilty of an injustice and will not be admitted to partake of the sacraments unless he submits faithfully. It is expected that the other bishops of the Province will follow Bishop LaFleche's example, and hay has become in late years one of the staple products of the Province.

A Spy Convicted.

NANCY, France, Oct. 10.

Mme. Bonet, in whose possession were found plans of the defences of Nancy, and who, when placed under arrest, confessed she was in the employ of the German Government, has been convicted of being a German spy, sentenced to five years' imprisonment and fined 500 francs. Upon the expiration of her imprisonment she will be exiled from France for ten years.

Dillon and O'Brien Missing.

LONDON, Oct. 10.

Messrs. Dillon and O'Brien have left the country, and there is no doubt their objective point is the United States. Up to the present hour absolutely nothing is known of the manner in which the two gentlemen succeeded in eluding the watchfulness of the large police and military force gathered in and about Tipperary. The escape caused great admiration and enthusiasm in the ranks of the Nationalists both in England and Ireland.

The McKinley Bill.

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.

A special from Washington says that John C. New, United States Consul General to London, said yesterday there is not so much dissatisfaction in England over the McKinley bill as on the continent. In Germany and France a good deal of clamour has arisen, but it will die out soon. They want our trade too much to carry out any retaliatory legislation.

Trouble Ahead.

LISBON, Oct. 10.

It is reported here that Portuguese gunboats have formed a line across the mouth of the Zambesi River in East Africa, to bar the passage of British gunboats. If they attempt the ascent of the river, only passive resistance, it is said, will be made in the advance of the British fleet.

Around the World.

MONTREAL, Oct. 10.

The Canadian Pacific's new steamer Empress of India will leave Liverpool for Vancouver on January 15th via Suez, Bombay and Yokohama, and will carry a large excursion party around the world. The price from Montreal back to Montreal is \$600.

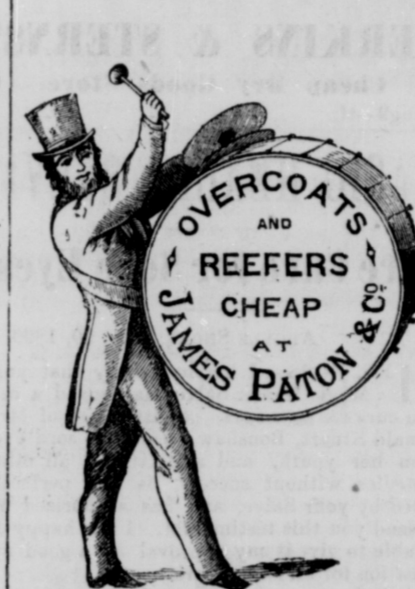
