RUSSIA AND FRANCE.
Henry Norman, the London correspondent of the New York Times, cables to that journal:
"Concerning the relations of France and Russia, I am able to tell you two little stories which throw much light upon them, and the accuracy of which I can guarantee. When Count Muraviev was in Paris, recently, he told President Faure that France must absolutely settle the Fashoda incident with England immediately and that then Russia would take the first opportunity of joining France in some common question against England, the Fashoda dispute being no good for this purpose. "Moreover, a distinguished Russian officer personally intimate, because of his family's position, with the Czar, was talking over the situation in France with a friend of mine, who repeated the conversation to me yesterday. The Russian said: "What France needs is an Emperor."
"Yes," said my friend, "but where will she find one."
"We are training one for her," was the reply in the Russian army."
"I wrote last week for Prince Louis Napoleon, and am still more convinced now that the lightning may come from that quarter."


