Missionary Nun Visits Province Sister de Ricci, the former Miss Mary Cain of New Perth, arrived in Charlottetown from New York yesterday evening on her second visit to the Province since she was granted a leave of absence from her missionary work in Asia last summer.

A member of the Maryknoll sisters, Sister de Ricci will return to the mission fields in the Far East shortly. During her visit to the Province she will speak to several public gatherings, the first talk being given in the Holy Name Hall on Sunday evening at eight o'clock. She will speak on missionary work in China.

The Island born nun has seen missionary service in Hong Kong, interior China and India. She was interned in Hong Kong by the Japanese during the war but managed to escape the camp and made her way to interior China.

Following the war she returned to Hong Kong to resume her position as head-mistress of Maryknoll School where she remained until she came to North America.

Sister de Ricci entered Maryknoll in 1923 and four years later went to China. Her visit home is the first in twenty three years.

Crown Appeals The Spence Case

The Crown is appealing against an Exchequer Court judgment for \$10,818 in favor of Trevelyan Spence, Charlottetown taxi driver, it was learned here last evening.

The judgment against the Department of National Defence was delivered Nov. 15 and was compensation for injuries resulting from the alleged negligence of an army driver near Mount Stewart. The army vehicle was on its way from Charlottetown to Souris carrying the Knights of Columbus ball team and the Exchequer Court judge ruled that the driver was acting within the scope of his duties, so that the Department was liable.

Telephone Line Repairs Are Being Continued

Total permanent repairs to telephone lines in the province may not be completed until next summer stated Mr. E. G. Cameron, Plant Superintendent of the Island Telephone Company last night following an almost complete survey of damages caused by the December 18 snowstorm.

All lines will be in working order by Wednesday of next week either through temporary, semi-permanent or permanent repairs, he stated.

After tramping along most of Prince and Queen and Counties side roads and viewing the damage, telephone company officials estimate that at least 450 poles were broken in the storm.

Miles and miles of wire were blown to the ground and it was estimated that 50 per cent of the wire was down in the areas between New London, Kensington, Borden and Bedouet.

Several areas between Read's Corner and Summerside and from Summerside to Miscouche have had to be entirely rebuilt with new poles, wire and cable.

About 1500 feet of cable is still under the ice in Summerside Harbour and another 1600 feet has to be laid in the east end of Summerside. Following the storm about seven miles of wire near the Summerside airport was a tangled mess on the ground.

The storm damage was heaviest from Borden to Wellington Corner. Half the wires in the Kensington, Borden and Summerside exchanges was down and about 200 poles in this area broken.

The repair men have been working night and day and have done a marvellous job, stated Mr. Cameron. He pointed out that despite the tremendous damage every toll centre in the Province had been connected a week after the storm.

HAMILTON, Jan. 5 - (CP) - Effective today, Studebaker passenger car prices in Canada have been increased from three to five per cent because of rising costs. D. C. Gaskin, vice-president and general manager of the Studebaker Corporation of Canada, has announced.

Cash increases range from a low of 85¢ to a high of \$133, including taxes. There is no change in truck prices, which were adjusted two or three weeks ago. The three-per-cent increase is levied on lower-priced models, and the five per cent, on the higher-priced.

Former Islander First Woman To Contest Mt. Royal

Mrs. Joan Storey, daughter of Dr. Jack Jenkins of this city, filed her nomination papers on December 22 to contest a civic election in the Town of Mount Royal, Quebec, thus becoming the first woman to contest a civic election in that centre.

Mrs. Storey was born in Charlottetown twenty-nine years ago and graduated from McGill University in 1942 with her husband. She then took a job with the Foreign Exchange Control Board, and later was appointed as economist to Commodity Prices Stabilization Corporation in Ottawa.

Prior to her marriage she worked as business and finance researcher for Time Magazine in New York. Her father served for eight years as a colonel in the Medical Corps in the last war.

In the coming election her opponent will be Ernie Lacroix. Mrs. Storey had attended a meeting of the Town Council on December 21 as a member of a delegation to officially register an objection to the violation of building regulations in her area. In fact, the mayor had suggested that "one of these charming ladies" contest the post left vacant by the death of Cecil Russell in December.

On thinking the matter over Mrs. Storey stated that nearly 25 per cent of the voters in Mount Royal are women who have never had representation of any kind in the government. "That's more," she said, "Municipalities should be primarily concerned with children—providing an education for them, parks for them to play in, and playground facilities."

Filing her nomination papers the next day, Mrs. Storey admitted it was bad psychology to talk of defeat, but if she doesn't win the election "I have at least paved the way for any woman who might decide to run in the future."

Week of Prayer Services Conclude

The final service in the local observance of the Universal Week of Prayer was held last evening when a very large congregation gathered in Zion Church. The worship was conducted by the Rev. C. C. Webster assisted by the Rev. E. C. Evans and Major Ernest Hutchinson.

The music of the service was under the direction of the church organist, Mr. Frank Johnston and included Malotte's arrangement of "The Lord's Prayer."

Prefacing his sermon the Rev. I. J. Levy warmly thanked the ministers of the City congregations and their people for the kindness of their welcome and the loyalty of their support.

The fourth and last address on the 23rd Psalm was based on the words, "And I shall dwell in the House of the Lord Forever" and brought to conclusion a most thoughtful and inspiring series of devotional studies.

Nephew Of P.E.I. Family Proposer Of New Calendar

A proposed perpetual calendar, originated by Lt. Comdr. Willard E. Edwards, U.S. Navy, nephew of Mr. and Mrs. L. John Westaway, Albion Lot 59, P.E.I., has been introduced in Washington, and legislation has been drafted for its proposed adoption beginning with the year 1956.

Lt. Comdr. Edwards, formerly an electrical engineer, graduate of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and the University of Oklahoma, and commercial airlines pilot, devised his calendar in 1919.

The perpetual calendar is a proposal for a new, 12 month, equal-quarter, international civil calendar. It gives the first month of each quarter thirty days, the second month thirty days, and the third month of each quarter thirty-one days. This brings the total days for the four quarters to 364, and an extra day, called New Year's day is added every year. As the 364th day would always fall on a Sunday, the extra New Year's Day would be a second Sunday.

In leap years another extra day would be added at the end of June and would also be an extra Sunday. The perpetual calendar can best be placed in effect following any year which ends with December 31 on a Saturday or Sunday as the proposed calendar commences on a Monday, and it was with this thought in mind that the Legislature was introduced to have it brought into effect in 1956.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5 - (AP) - Russia puzzled American officials today by having agreed after a lapse of more than two years to resume negotiations to settle the Soviets' \$11,000,000,000 lend-lease account with the United States run up during the Second World War.

Talks on terms of a general settlement of the useful American supplies left in Russia at V-J day will be resumed Jan. 15 at Washington, the State Department announced. They were broken off in mid-1948 but meantime Moscow has made a piecemeal payoff by returning 28 out of more than 800 vessels the U. S. loaned its former ally in wartime.

B. I. S. Regular Monthly Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the Benevolent Irish Society was held in the Whelan Memorial Hall last night with Mr. James Hogan presiding over the large number of members present. Reports for the last quarter were given by the different chairmen and all reports showed that the committees were continuing their usual good work.

Play director Mr. J. Pius Callaghan reported that practices for the annual St. Patrick's play, "The Irish Professor," will begin in the near future and that preparations for the celebration are beginning to take shape.

Initiation night was set for Friday, January 26 when several new members will be initiated. Highlight of the meeting was the report of the chairman of the society's public dances which showed that the dances were well attended. A large amount of the proceeds were spent in charitable relief to the needy of all denominations. A special meeting of the charity committee will be held shortly to lay further plans for aiding the needy as many calls from those in need have been made on the society.

Railway Operating Employees Seek Wage Boost

OTTAWA, Jan. 5 - (CP) - A new round in the long railway wage dispute will open next week. Operating employees, those who run the trains - will re-open negotiations with the companies Jan. 10 at Montreal for a 30-cent-an-hour wage increase for about 35,000 men.

That aspect of the dispute is being revived after having been pushed into the background by the more turbulent struggle involving 124,000 non-operating employees who tied up the railroads with a general strike last August.

Final settlement of the claims of the larger group last Dec. 19 paved the way for the resumption of negotiations with the trainmen, which had been allowed to lapse while a Government arbitrator was cleaning up the other case late in 1950.

Three unions are involved in the latest set of negotiations, representing conductors, firemen and trainmen. The locomotive engineers are engaged in still another set of negotiations.

Island Man Dies In N. S.

NEW GLASGOW, N. S. Jan. 5 - (CP) - An inquest jury today found that the death of Alex John O'Leary, lumberman at nearby Barney's River, was caused by a "heart condition which could have been brought on by the drinking of methyl alcohol."

The body of O'Leary, a native of Prince Edward Island, was found at the lumber camp Dec. 26. The inquest followed a pathological examination. O'Leary was described as middle-aged.

Leadership Course Concludes Today

A cross section of the rural youth of the Province engaged in another full day's activities in the Leadership Training Course at Prince of Wales College and the Vocational School yesterday. The five-day course concludes today.

Dr. Frank MacKinnon, Principal of Prince of Wales College started the ball rolling yesterday with his interesting and instructive address to the young members on "The Church and the State."

During the morning the members spent an hour studying the role of the school in democracy. The instruction was capably conducted by Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie, Chief Supervisor of Schools. Films were shown to the group before noon.

Debate Held The highlight of the afternoon's activities was debate between ten members on the subject that "Electricity is more essential on a farm than a modern water and sewerage system."

The pro side of the argument was upheld by Robert Schurman, Freetown; Joseph McIsaac, and Charles McKenna, Bear River; Vivian Barrett, Lot 16 and Arnold MacRae, Wheatley River.
