CONTRACT BRIDGE

By E. JAV BECKER. South dealer. Neither side vulnerable. NORTH ♠ J 3 2 ♥ 7 3 ♦ A Q 10 5 4 3 ♣ K Q WEST ♠ 10 9 7 6 ♥ A 8 5 4 2 ♦ 7 3 ♣ 6 7 EAST ♠ A 8 5 4 ♥ K J ♦ K 8 6 ♣ 9 7 5 4 SOUTH ♠ K Q ♥ Q 10 9 ♦ J 9 2 ♣ A J 10 8 3

The bidding: South West North East 1 NT Pass 1 NT Pass 3 NT Pass. Opening lead—five of hearts. This hand may not make such sense, but it has its amusing side. It first appeared back in the 1930's in one of Ely Culbertson's books at a time when he was at the crest of his fame as a bridge player and showman extraordinary.

The bidding was not any different than it would be today. The opening heart, lead was standard. East winning with the king and returning the jack. South covered with the queen and West had a genuine problem whether to take with the ace. He didn't know who had the missing ten.
