MONDAY

Petty Officer George M. Court of Charlottetown has been selected to represent R. C. S. C. C. Kent on the Canadian Sea Cadet party at the Coronation ceremonies in June.

P.O. Court, who is a son of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Court, 26 Kensington Road, is a graduate of West Kent School and a first year student at Prince of Wales College. He joined the Sea Cadets in September 1948 as an Ordinary Cadet and was promoted to Able Cadet in October 1949, Leading Cadet in 1950, and Petty Officer in the fall of 1951.

With Summerside being their only port of landing in Canada, five Lincoln aircraft carrying fifty members of a specialist navigation course from the Royal Air Force Flying College in Mambay, England, are expected to arrive at R. C. A. P. Station, Summerside on Wednesday about 6 p.m.

The speaker said he could offer a whole lifetime of work to offset his charge. "If I gave that impression it was done unconsciously as I am an enemy of no one," Dr. MacMillan said to a burst of applause from both sides of the House.

OTTAWA, (CP)—Transport Minister Chevrier said Tuesday he has made a suggestion to the Prince Edward Island Government for an arrangement concerning use of the Hillsborough bridge near Charlottetown.

Mr. Chevrier, speaking to the Commons railway committee, gave no details of his proposal.

The bridge, formerly used by the Canadian National Railways, was condemned a few years ago by the board of transport commissioners for railway use.

Since then, the federal and P. E. I. governments have been in discussions as to its status.

During discussion in committee of the Legislature of the Civil Service Act Major John A. MacDonald, third King's, proposed an amendment which would coincide with the clause in the Federal Service Act guaranteeing the veterans' preference.

Hon. A. W. Matheson, promoter of the bill, said the proposed Act was not costly to the Province as the public servants had contributed to a retirement fund. He said the veterans' preference clause was not in the Act but that the Government tried to give a preference although it was true that it was not always done.

Approximately one hundred members of the P. E. I. Federation of Agriculture and others interested in the report of the Custom Killing Plant committee heard at a meeting in the Clover Club last night, presided over by Mr. Roland MacDonald, the Federation president.

A resolution that "the matter be left in the hands of the committee to continue work under the supervision of the board of directors" brought the session to a close at midnight.

The report, which was submitted and moved for adoption by the chairman of the committee, Mr. Andrew Stevenson, and seconded Mr. Louis MacDonald, brought to light many details as to cost of construction of the partly completed Wheatley plant, and the sum required to complete the same should it be deemed expedient by the farmers to purchase shares at \$25 per share and own and operate the same.

GLACE BAY, N.S. (CP)—Playing coach Hub Macey slapped home a goal at 10:55 of a third overtime period Wednesday to give Glace Bay Miners a 4-3 win over Charlottetown Islanders in their Maritime Major Hockey League semi-finals.

The win knotted the best-of-nine series at three games each. The seventh game will be in Charlottetown Friday and the winners of the series will meet Halifax Atlantics for the league title.

For the Miners, playing without the services of Gordie Miller and Eddie Joss, it was an uphill battle all the way.

Mr. Darby estimated total expenditures for next year at \$9,650,839 and total revenues at \$8,918,002. Included in the expenditures, he noted, is sinking fund appropriation of \$566,425.

Dealing with increased expenditures in various departments, the Minister called attention to the vote to Charlottetown and the incorporated towns which is being increased from \$2.00 to \$2.50 per capita, and to villages from 75 cts. to \$1.00.

In the Department of Education, 65,000 more will be expended on teachers' salaries and the overall increase will be almost \$100,000. Agricultural estimates have been increased by \$47,380 and Health and Welfare by \$211,000.

The highway program for next year involves an outlay of \$1,211,000 on ordinary account, as well as \$1,736,500 of capital expenditures, including \$350,000 on the Trans-Canada highway from Bonshaw to the Queen's Arms and a new North River bridge.

The Supply asked for, Mr. Darby stated, "would appear to be well within our capacity to pay without resorting to additional taxation. In fact, with careful handling and with the probability of revenues exceeding the minimum basis of forecast, we can, at least, have a reasonable hope of again attaining this year's achievement—the payment of both ordinary and capital expenditures out of current income."
