

Black Hawks, Habs Win; Bruins & Leafs Deadlock

CHICAGO (AP)—Chicago Black Hawks took over sole possession of first place in the National Hockey League Sunday night by beating New York Rangers 6-1 in a game marked by a pair of goal disputes.

The victory moved the Hawks two points ahead of Montreal and Detroit, tied for second as a result of the Canadiens beating the Red Wings Sunday night.

Rookie referee Bruce Hood took two goals away from the Rangers in the third period. The first came in the first minute when New York's Vic Hadfield fired a shot that got past Hawk goalie Glenn Hall, but bounced quickly back into play after hitting a post. Goal Judge John Trappina did not turn on the red light signalling a goal, but Hood stopped play and pointed to Hadfield, indicating a goal had been scored.

Hall raced from his net and barged into the official and had to be restrained by teammates. Then, after a conference with the goal judge and linesmen Matt Pavlich and Neil Armstrong, Hood reversed his call and disallowed the goal.

Later in the period, Don Marshall of the Rangers fired a puck from close range and Trappina flashed the red light. This time, Hood ruled the puck had not gone in and again disallowed the goal.

Ranger coach Emile Francis then opened the gate at the bench, tossed a towel on the ice and knelt on it with hands pressed together in supplication. Chico Maki paced the Chicago attack with his 11th and 12th goals of the year. Other Chicago scorers were Ken Wharram, Doug Mohs, Red Hay and Eric Nesterenko. Marshall scored New York's goal.

MONTREAL 4 DETROIT 3
DETROIT (AP)—Gilles Tremblay's goal sealed Montreal to the third period carried Montreal to a 4-3 National Hockey League victory over Detroit Red Wings Sunday night and snapped the Canadiens' 13-game winless streak on Detroit ice.

The victory was Montreal's first in Detroit since Feb. 16, 1964. The best the Canadiens were able to do in their 13 previous appearances was three ties.

Claude Provost scored twice for Montreal in the first period, while John Ferguson tallied once in the second.

Alex Delvecchio, playing his 1,000th NHL game, scored Detroit's first goal in the opening period. Gordie Howe and Ron Murphy added Red Wing goals in the second period.

BOSTON (CP)—Forward Orlando Kurtenbach scored after a bit of unorthodox strategy by Toronto coach Punch Imlach in the third period Sunday night to give Toronto Maple Leafs a 4-4 National Hockey League tie with Boston Bruins.

After the Bruins had gone ahead on goals by Johnny Bucyk and Dean Prentice, Imlach sent out Kurtenbach, normally a penalty killer, and moved defenseman Tim Horton to a wing on the other side of Pete Stenkowski.

The move paid off as Horton sent the puck into Boston territory. Stenkowski dug it out from behind the net and passed out to Kurtenbach, who fired a 12-footer for his seventh goal of the season.

Boston jumped out to a 1-0 lead on Tom Williams' 14th goal, a tip-in of an Ed Westfall shot while the Leafs were shorthanded after less than four minutes of play.

Prentice's goal was his seventh of the season and his first in 15 games.

Johnston turned in a spectacular performance in the Boston goal, kicking out 33 shots, including one with his bare hand in the final minute. Toronto goalie Terry Sawchuk had 24 saves.

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Canadian Nancy Greene Overcomes Injury To Win

BANFF, Alta., (CP)—Nancy Greene, skiing on the brink of disaster, recorded an easy victory Saturday in the women's slalom of the Canadian international ski meet.

Refusing to pamper an injured ankle, the miss from Roseland, B.C., defeated 16 rivals by 3.10 seconds over a rugged Mount Norquay course.

Kurt Huggler of Switzerland flashed through the men's giant slalom course in 1:50.09 to capture the opening event of the meet, first held in Canada under sanction of the International Ski Federation.

Huggler, 22, defeated Gerhard Nennung of Austria by 17-100ths of a second. Ed Bruggmann of Switzerland was third in 1:50.95.

In fifth place in the men's event, behind Louis Jauffret of

France, was Scott Henderson of Banff, leading Canadian slalomist in the men's field of 44.

After her victory, Miss Greene said her injured ankle did not hamper her performance.

"It isn't something to think about when you're going full out," she said. Miss Greene nearly fell twice over the rugged course but maintained control to win easily.

Henderson covered the 62-gate course in 1:52.45. Behind him were Felice Denicolo of Italy, Giovanoli Durini of Montreal, Franz Overland of Norway and in 10th place promising Canadian Keith Sheppard of Lake Louise, Alta.

Saint Dunstan's University Saints soundly defeated the University of New Brunswick Red Devils 6-3 in a Maritime intercollegiate hockey league game played before 1500 fans at the SDU rink Saturday night. The Saints led 2-1 at the end of the first period and extended their lead to 5-1 after two periods but were outscored 2-1 by the Red Devils in the third stanza.

The first period was easily the most exciting seen at the SDU rink this year. The typical Peter Kelly coached UNB team featuring small fast breaking forwards with precision, passing looked every bit as good as Jack Kane's Saints in the first stanza. Their top line of Austin Duquette left wing, Marty Winslow at center, and Herb Wayslave gave the SDU goalies, Carl MacQuaid, many anxious moments.

With nearly a minute gone in the stanza and the Saints pressing in the UNB end UNB defencemen Jim Morell hit speedy Marty Wilson with a breakaway pass at centre ice. Winslow skated in quickly and fired a high drive from 25 feet out that SDU goalie Carl MacQuaid took on his shoulder. Just two minutes later SDU defenceman Art LeClair hit Maurice Roy with a pass from centre ice that put him in the clear but the UNB goalie Jacobson came up with a big save, getting a part of his stick on Roy's high drive. 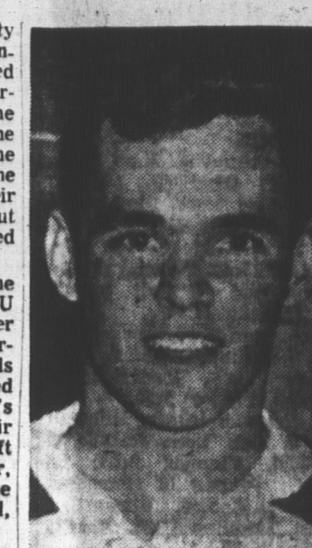
