Oscar Gaudet Soon To Fly

More than a few people around the Maritimes and Charlottetown recognize the name Oscar Gaudet and it is quite likely that they are going to hear a lot more of this strapping 22 year old youngster within the next few seasons.

Gaudet is a native of Moncton and received the great part of his amateur schooling (hockey wise) in the picture province. Working his way up through the minor ranks Gaudet showed flashes of brilliance and at one time played with Charlottetown's Alf Flanagan on the Moncton Junior Beavers. The third member of this trio was Phil Dorion who dented the twins five times against the Royals so one can imagine the strength of the team.

From there he graduated to the Moncton Hawks, who were then in the now defunct Maritime Senior League and emerged second highest in the race for scoring honors, even though he was giving away valuable years of experience to the elder statesmen in the league. If they only could match him now.

"Oscar Gaudet has class written all over him, both on the ice and off" his present manager Gus Kyle recently stated and Gaudet has certainly proved this in the past two seasons. After having starred for the American League Buffalo Bisons last season Oscar moved up a rank to the St. Louis Braves of the Central Pro League and already has established himself as one of the hottest properties in the loop. Gaudet has already banged the puck home 23 times and enjoys the league lead in this department. He has 29 more scheduled games to terrorize opposing goalies but murmurs in the background state that it is not likely that he will last that long in the league.

No, he's not going to be demoted to a lesser league but elevated and seeing as how the CPHL is the second strongest pro team he has only one direction to move and that is up. The Black Hawks are not really noted for having the strongest right wing corps in the league (Maki, Angotti and Mohs) and it could very well be that he will be called up to the parent club within the next few weeks.

However there is only one thing that has kept him from joining the NHL before now, speed. As his present coach explains "The only thing that Gaudet needs is a bit more speed." All other reports on the budding young star hear nothing but praise on his shoulders. Kyle went on to say that "Oscar's a major league" "because he has so many things going for him. He never quits-whether we're far ahead or behind. And he's blessed with the ability to score and to set up the right kind of passes. He has everything else a good player needs, including a great future with Black Hawks who have big plans for him. Gaudet should go on and on because he never does the same thing twice."

That's a lot of praise coming from a seasoned pro coach and the youngster could go a long way. With the dirge of Maritimers in the NHL now it sure would be gratifying to hockey officials in the Atlantic Provinces to see another of their proteges make the grade.

KILLY ENTERS INTERNATIONAL

The world's foremost male skier has announced his intentions of competing in Canada's first world wide scale ski meet, the Du Maurier International to be held at Mont St. Anne, just outside of Quebec City, February 19-20th.

Killy loomed over the world as a budding star three seasons ago and then last season made himself a name as the best man in the world in the slalom and giant slalom. This season he has been upstaged a couple of times by the famous Billy Kidd of the U.S. but he is still generally recognized as the best in the world at his trade. His emergence to full stardom is a result of a new outlook on the art of slalom that has been christened as the "hari-kari style" the connoisseurs of skiing technique.

Two major themes that characterize his technical evolution are purely French in origin. One is the serpent. This refers to skiing with great elasticity, with the skis practically flat and with edging reduced to a minimum. A second facet is the cramponage (a powerful clinging to the slope as with crampons used in climbing on ice). "This appears to be a contradiction of the first, but Killy says in each traverse the cramponage enables you to gain about two feet in height. "It holds you to a higher line on the course, enabling you to leave the gate faster with your skis flatter and straighter." By combining both, Killy is able to put all the peculiarities of terrain to his advantage.

To prepare himself for the ski season, Killy trains with 40 miles of bicycle riding daily, often going to the top of a steep mountain and coming down at 50 miles per hour. Another trick is to climb a mountain and then run down as fast as possible among rocks and trees. He claims there is nothing better to improve one's balance.

Little wonder that most experts agree Jean Claude Killy is today's par excellent alpine racer.

Colorful Jacques Plante Huge Success At Morell

By JIM CULLEN Jacques Plante, former National Hockey League great, overwhelmed the people attending the annual Morell Sportsmen's Dinner last night with his generosity. Plante stayed for approximately one hour after the dinner and speeches were completed to sign autographs and answer numerous questions.

Hon. Leo Rossiter, chairman of the dinner, commented last night that this was the biggest year yet for the annual dinner and said there were approximately 325 people served at the high school gymnasium. The ladies of the community served the dinner and the service was excellent. J. Charles Campbell was master of ceremonies for the evening program and kept things moving at a rapid pace to the apparent approval of everyone.

The evening was a huge success from opening grace by Rev. T. P. Butler to the closing remarks by Rev. Donald McLennan. Mr. Plante was introduced as the guest speaker by Hon. Leo Rossiter, who extended greetings to the gathering on behalf of the province in the absence of Premier Walter Shaw who is out of the province.

In introducing Mr. Plante, Mr. Rossiter gave a brief outline of the illustrious career of the former masked marvel of the NHL. Jacques opened his address by telling the people of his early life in his home town of Shawinigan Falls, Quebec and outlined several of the events which led him to fame in hockey's greatest league.

During the course of his address Mr. Plante told the gathering his December 15th game with the Montreal Junior Canadiens against the Russian National Hockey team proved to be one of the greatest days of his life. He recalled that just before the game was over with the Junior Canadiens leading 2-1 the fans in the Montreal Forum all stood up and began clapping for him and Jacques said he interpreted this as the fans way of telling him "we remember you Jacques" and he said tears came to his eyes.

The famed goaltender said he gave everything in that game and added he didn't feel any man could stand that much tension twice in his life. Plante hadn't played hockey for a considerable time before this and had only five practices before he went between the pipes for the Baby Habs against the Russians. He had never seen the Russians play previous to this game.

He concluded his address by telling the group of several humorous incidents concerning some of his friends in the NHL. Some of the prominent head-line guests at last night's dinner included: Lt. Governor W.J. MacDonald; Hon. Leo Rossiter, representing the Premier; Alex Campbell, provincial liberal leader; and Mayor Walter Cox of Charlottetown and David B. L. Turner (A) 103 000 000 1-15.

Plante arrived in Morell in the afternoon and showed films to school children in the area as well as refereeing a bantam hockey game at the rink Plante handed out over 500 autographed pictures of himself to school children as well as spending considerable time signing autographs.
