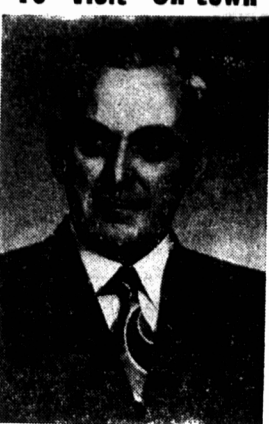

Almost continuous films were shown on the subject of Safety, first and Better Driving. These films are both entertaining and educational. They show the inconvenience a discourteous driver can put other people to, and point out that what is considered an innocent non-observance of traffic rules can result in untold damage to another vehicle and occupants.

Not all of the pictures concerned the drivers of cars. The pedestrian came in for a few eye openers when it was disclosed how a carelessly driving pedestrian can become an annoyance as well as cause a serious accident. In addition to the moving pictures, there were a number of actual still scenes of accidents which happened on Prince Edward Island. A good majority of them resulting fatalities. An official from the Motor Vehicle Branch observed that out of an estimated 10,000 or more people who visited the booth, it is hoped that many people will make an honest effort to improve their driving. He added that he has saved one life by these pictures, then we have accomplished something. Every motorist would do well to take advantage of the opportunity to see these pictures.

News In Brief

WINDSOR, N. S. (CP)—The Maritime epidemic of crop-destroying army worms began hitting Nova Scotia farmers where it really hurt Friday, showing up in the rich apple-growing belt of the Annapolis Valley.

ST. JOHN'S (CP)—Company and union officials continued negotiations in Bonavista Friday in an attempt to settle a strike called Tuesday by the 345-man local of the Newfoundland Federation of Fishermen against the Bonavista Cold Storage Company.

AUBENAS, France (Reuters)—Fifteen persons were reported killed Friday when a bus plunged through a guard rail on a mountain road and fell 90 feet into the River Ardeche near here.

ATHENS, Greece (Reuters)—Athens municipal council has decided to change the name of Churchill Street, the main thoroughfare, to Stadium Street as a protest against British policy toward Cyprus.

PARIS (AP)—The French National Assembly has again postponed debate on the European Defence Community. It gave itself until Aug. 28 to study Premier Pierre Mendes-France's proposed changes before formally considering ratifying the EDC treaty. Previously, debate had been scheduled for Aug. 24.

WINDSOR, Ont. (CP)—Resolutions approved by Windsor Chamber of Commerce for submission to the Canadian Chamber of Commerce annual meeting at Halifax Oct. 4 to 7 call for elimination of excise tax on automobiles, improvement of income tax medical expense formula and a study to simplify tax and other corporate returns.

PANKTFURT, Germany (AP)—First swinging police and union pickets fought in Munich streets Friday in the fifth day of Bavaria's critical metal workers strike. Eight strikers were jailed. Dozens were injured, although most policemen did not use their clubs.

FREDERICTON (CP)—Preliminary work on the \$45,000,000 Beechwood power project on the St. John river near Woodstock will begin Monday. Premier Hugh John Flemming's administration said Friday it had let contracts for rail and highway diversions around the site.

NEWARK, O. (AP)—AM 36 crew members parachuted from a U. S. air force KB-29 refueling plane near here Friday, and the big plane, two engines dead and another a fire, crashed and burned in a field. The plane was on a routine training flight from Dow air force base near Bangor, Me.

Big Program Before Fair Closes Tonight

Old Home Week and the Provincial Exhibition will officially close tonight at midnight. The weather throughout the week was not favourable for an outside show, but in spite of this there was a large attendance each day. Several of the races were rained out entirely and on other occasions they could be run off. These were re-scheduled for a later date.

The new coliseum made cattle judging a pleasure for both exhibitors and spectators and the attractive merchandise booths in for some favorable comment from the thousands who visited them. If weather reports can be relied upon, today is supposed to be clear and fine. In such case afternoon and evening races will be run with a splendid racing card at both events to complete the big week.

The Bill Lynch Shows will remain and continue to run until midnight. These shows and rides are attracting a large following this year and today should see a record crowd on the midway.

Parliamentarians Well Represented At The Exhibition

Both the House of Commons in Ottawa, and the local legislature, not to mention the Senate have been actively represented at the Old Home Week and annual Exhibition. On the race track the Hon. Roulford MacKinnon, Provincial Minister of Public Works, scored a good win with his durable green pacer Colonel Budlong, and Senator George Barbour's seasoned campaigner My Darling was well up in the pacing event in which he started.

Scoring up well at the cattle show was a number of fine cattle, as Mr. George Kilson, Provincial M.L.A. Mr. Kilson, from the farmers point of view, thought the cattle show above the ordinary and the new building in which it was held, a very fine asset for future shows.

Taking an active part also at the cattle show, was Mr. Neil A. Matheson, Queens County representative at Ottawa. Mr. Matheson was not an exhibitor, but gave assistance to the judges from time to time, when called on. For a number of years before going to Ottawa Mr. Matheson was secretary of various cattle breeders associations and his experienced co-operation with the judges at the show was of great assistance. As one of the Exhibition Directors, Mr. R. Bell leader of the Opposition in the local House, was present during the entire week with the rest of the members of the Exhibition he took a full part in overseeing and directing the many attractions presented to the public during the week.

Seven Arraigned For Car Thefts

MONTREAL (CP)—Seven men were arraigned Friday on charges of conspiring to steal and receive stolen cars valued at \$35,000. The men were arrested in what police described as the smashing of one of the biggest stolen car rings ever to operate in the city. Police said the men would steal a car and then buy a wrecked vehicle of the same make and year.

After replacing parts to make identification difficult they would paint the stolen vehicle and sell it. The accused were identified as Denis Blodreau, 21, Paul Francoeur, 36, Yvon Mieux, 24, Maurice Lacroix, 27, all of Montreal; Gaston Dupont, 20, Rosemount; Gaston L'Etienne, 26, Actonville, Que.; and Rene Pelletier of no known address. They will appear for preliminary hearing Tuesday.

Thinks Seaweed Good For Brain

TORONTO (CP)—Dr. Syuzo Naka, a smiling psychiatrist from Japan, in Toronto for the Mental Health Congress beginning today, thinks seaweed is the answer to child brain troubles. He discovered that a substance called galactose, found in seaweed, has a decisive effect on brain growth in children during their first three years, the period of greatest development.

Galactose is found in human and cow's milk and the milk of any other animal with a brain, Dr. Naka said. But in Japan, he said, children receive only 1-30th of the milk supply a Canadian baby gets. Mental retardation there is a great problem. Studying cases of 900 mentally deficient children, doctors found half suffered from malnutrition and another quarter from disease or injury to the head during the critical three years.

LOTS OF PAPER WORK INVOLVED FOR COURSE CLERK ON RACE DAYS

"There is a whole lot of paper work connected with this horse-racing game which the general public knows very little about," said manager H. J. Kennedy of the Charlottetown Exhibition Association as the 1954 show concluded last night.

This very essential work is carried out by a woman known to hundreds of Maritime horsemen, Miss Ida Yeo, of Charlottetown. The time-honored title of her position is "Clerk of the Course," and Miss Yeo has filled the difficult position for a number of years.

Throughout the racing season she lives in a world of horsemen, judges, timers and race track directors.

During the pre-racing season she assists many horsemen to register their colts with the United States Trotting Association. Every newcomer to racing must be registered as to name, age, color and breeding. She also is available to the many horsemen who must forward forms required to the United States Trotting Association to remain each year a horse's eligibility to take part in competition. Without such eligibility he cannot start on any track under the Trotting Association's jurisdiction. But it is on race day that Miss Yeo's duties assume the greatest importance.

meet by the full staff of judges, by all the timers assigned to the track and by Miss Yeo as Clerk of the Course. It is forwarded at the end of the week to the United States Trotting Association. The report is detailed and complete. It lists the name of each horse performing, the number of his eligibility certificate, allotted him by the United States Trotting Association, and without which he would not be permitted to start. It shows the position of each horse at the end of each heat and his winnings for the heat.

The color, age and sex of each entry is given along with the name of his sire, the names of the driver and owner. The drivers license number is also part of the record. One portion of the form is reserved for a notation concerning any appeals, protests, fines or other penalties occurring during the meet, and another space has room for entering the times of the race, at the quarter, half, three-quarter and mile posts. Miss Yeo is precise in keeping these daily racing records and is keenly aware of their importance.

Between times, as the meet progresses, she is very helpful to Dr. Douglas, the pre-racing judge, and other officials in the stand, in reference to the breeding, past performances, and ownership of the horses.

"The Clerk of the Course" is an indispensable part of racing, and it's an office that demands — and in this case has — alertness, experience, accuracy.
